Here's some more old-time trivia. Raleigh's first fire horses were placed in service by 1889. They pulled the Rescue steamer, which had been hand-pulled (!) for years. Stables were added to the Rescue engine house and the horses were kept under the control of the fire department. Two years later, the horses were placed under the control of the Street Commissioner, and were subsequently used along with other city horses for non-fire duties such as drawing street sprinklers. It seems it was another decade-ish before the department had dedicated fire horses.



To amend this information, Raleigh's fire horses continued to perform other duties until at least 1910. From the city minutes "the Chief of the Fire Dept shall each day, except Sundays, during the months of Apr, May, June, July, Aug, Sept and Oct, furnish a team [of horses] and a driver to the san[itation] dept for purpose of watering the streets." Presumably the horses were exclusively used by the fire department after it became fully-paid in 1912. This has not been confirmed, however.



Fire Chief's Duties, 1888

09/18/06 347 W - + 16 - 11

From Section 5, Chapter 4 of the Raleigh City Ordinance, adopted October 1888: "The Chief shall have control of the engine houses, engines, apparatus, the horse of the engine reel, and all other property of the Fire Department. He shall inspect the same once in every week, see that everything is kept in a condition that is efficient service, and report all needed repairs to the Committee, who shall have authority to order the same. He shall have an annual inspection of the apparatus of the whole department, and make a report of same to the Committee on Fire Department.

"During fires and inspections he shall control all fire-plugs, maintain order among the firemen, note and report to the Mayor all violations of law or of city ordinances, and do all things property for the efficient operation of the department. He shall report annual to the Mayor the names, ages, residences and occupation of the firemen, the number and localities of the fires which have occurred during the year, the causes thereof, if they can be ascertained, the names of the owners of the property destroyed or injured, the amount of such destruction or injury, and such other matters touching its operations and organization as he shall think proper.

"He shall examine all fire-alarm boxes at least once in two weeks, or oftener if necessary, and shall have all repairs immediately attended to. He shall examine all fire hydrants at least once in three months, and shall make a report of same to the Mayor. He shall also keep a record of all accounts of the Fire Department and Fire-alarm Telegraph, showing where all material was used, and submit the same to the Committee whenever called up to do so.

"He shall give bond in the sum of \$500, subject to be increased by the Board of Alderman, for the faithful discharged of his duties, and may be suspended by the Committee on Fire Department for neglect of duty or incompetence in office until the matter can be brought before the Board of Alderman for investigation and action."

And don't drive over the darn hose!

13. That if any wagon, cart, street-car, or other vehicle, be willfully driven over the hose belonging to the Fire Department, laid in the streets, lanes, alleys or squares, at the occurrence of any fire in the city, or at any alarm of fire, the driver or owner or owners of such vehicles shall be fined for such offence fifteen dollars or imprisoned for thirty days.



Raleigh's first fire boxes were installed in 1888 in ten locations around downtown. They're listed below, and mapped on the following presentday street map. Notice that the boxes were spread across several blocks. A person reporting a fire might travel a couple blocks to the alarm box. Click to enlarge:



The boxes were also locked at the outset, so a keyholder had to be found first. Keys were kept at nearby businesses or residences. Activating a box resulted in the City Bell sounding at Metropolitan Hall, the long red building indicated on the map. It also housed some of the fire companies, along with the other red buildings on the map, which indicate fire stations.

- Box 13, southeast corner Johnson and Halifax streets
- Box 14, southwest corner Oakwood Avenue and Person Street
- Box 15, northwest corner Edenton and East streets
- Box 23, northwest corner Martin and Wilmington streets
- Box 24, northeast corner Davie and Bloodworth streets
- Box 25, southwest corner Wilmington and South streets
- Box 31, southwest corner Davie and Dawson streets
- Box 32, southwest corner Hillsboro and West streets
- Box 41, west side of Dawson Street midway between Jones and Lane streets
- Box 42, northwest corner of Halifax and Edenton streets.

Units on the first alarm assignment- Apex E1, E2, E3, Tower 1, and Batt. Chief 1; auto aid was Holly Springs E1. Second alarm brought Apex E4 and Cary E5. Morrisville initially brought E3 to the scene, but were released in order to cover the district. Units found heavy fire upon arrival with reports of several explosions having happened prior to the FD's arrival. All occupants were out prior to arrival... fire attack was strictly defensive operation.

Was riding OIC on Tower 1, there was nothing we could do with this one. We just got back in bed after a fire alarm call when we were dispatched to it. Explosion sent roof shingles to the yard of a house 3 houses down the block. Room above the garage had partially collapsed into the garage already when we arrived. There were 2 propane tanks in the garage, 150 lbs. a piece, along with a gas water heater. Occupants were very, very lucky.

From Raleigh's *Daily Sentinel* newspaper, February 5, 1870: "Pay up. Those who have heretofore subscribed for the benefit of the Fire Department of Raleigh, [they] are requested to pay in their subscriptions to either of the banks of the city, stating also, to what particular purpose they may wish their subscription applied. If we are to have an efficient Fire Department, it is high time more effectual steps were taken to organize. There is no lack of men, and property holders must apply the means. Every property holder of the city, and every Insurance Company is interested in the matter-- will they toe the mark of duty in regard to it!"

The context of this interesting notice involves the formation of the Rescue Steam Fire Engine Company and the purchase of Raleigh's first steam fire engine. The fire company solicited funds both before and after the apparatus purchase, expecting to raise the necessary amount to pay the balance in full. They held fundraisers and solicited "subscriptions" from property owners. Alas, two years, they petitioned the city to pay the remaining balance, which the city did.



Dispatch commenced to notify all EWFD personnel of the need for more manpower, versus dispatching another round of EWFD and other department units. That must be county protocol, though it seems kind of strange. Perhaps "second alarm" in the county translates to "second activation of department pagers."

No I believe that is more of an Eastern Wake thing. Comm. asked if they wanted a second alarm, or second activation. EW command said just to dispatch a Wendell tanker, and EW for more personel.

As long as I have been here, he has always asked for a second alarm on working fires. I think what he is asking for is additional manpower. Eastern Wake EMS took some great pictures of the fire last night. Mike, I will get those to you as soon as I can. Overall, everyone did a great job last night.

There was and has been some talk, at the Chief/County/RWECC level, about what a "second alarm" means. I think there might be some standard terms coming in the future, like second alarm, water task force, additional manpower, working fire, etc. Hard to say at this point what any of those will translate to, but it would provide a standard for both field units and the ECC.

I think that would be a good idea. That way when you call for a 2nd alarm you get 2 more engs, truck and rescue from the next closest departments. If you need water because there are no hydrants and you don't need manpower, you call for a tanker task force. If you only need 1 additional truck, then you don't call a second alarm, you make a speciality call. I also then that we need a working fire dispatch, that being an additional eng and ladder company when a working fire is confirmed. The county should also start doing move ups. I know many departments do it on their own at this time. That being asking for another department to send an eng company to stand by.

Web Sites / Useability / Some Thoughts

Since the morning was spent clicking around the county's assorted FD sites, here are some random, generic usability observations. Web team members reading this are welcome to mail Mike privately for more information, suggestions, etc. He also apologies in advance for any personal offense taken by page designers or web folks. It's great to see so many web sites associated with all or nearly all of the county fire departments and related organizations. Kudos all around.

URL as UI. It is helpful to be able to truncate a web site address and still navigate the site. For example, if http://www.sometown.com/depts/fire/webpage.htm (fake address) is the address of the fire department's section of a town web site, it is helpful if shortened versions of that address open valid pages. Such as http://www.sometown.com/depts/fire/ or http://www.sometown.com/depts.

Above the Fold. It is helpful to locate the most important information on a web site in the top of the browser, e.g. in the area that the user sees before they start scrolling. Since users have varying screen resolutions and desktop sizes, consider testing pages with different screen resolutions and desktop sizes to see the variations in just how much information is displayed before scrolling is started.

Above the Fold, Part 2. As screen real estate is valuable, consider shrinking some of the elements on the top or very top of the pages. Such as large or giant banners, or patches, or other graphics. Experiment with a couple versions, and using a couple different screen resolutions or desktop sizes. Let other members, or family members, or visitors try the thing.

Alpha Ordering. It is helpful to order a vertical list of navigation links alphabetically. That is the ordering method that users most easily and quickly comprehend.

Update Dates. Easily visible "this page / site was last updated on..." dates are usually useful, especially on sites that are infrequently updated.

Postscript. See http://www.useit.com/ for an introduction, albeit perhaps a complex introduction, to the wonderful world of useability. On good days, my own sites observe such best practices.

I'll add my \$.02 in here:

- o I agree with Mike on alphabetizing lists (navigation), so I'll take it a step further. Most people can't comprehend past about seven things, so when grouping navigation, do so in groups of about five to seven elements.
- o Each page should have a link back to the home page of the site. I also thinks it a good idea to graphically reinforce the url of the site (hence the name "firenews.net" and "ncsfa.com").
- o From a design standpoint, there's no need to come up with a unique design for each page. In fact, it's my opinion that your interior pages should be poured into a template. The homepage can be different, but just slightly so.
- o And please do everyone a favor: no Station 51 tones, no Federal Q's, the theme from BackDraft and/or Rescue Me, your favorite song, etc. It's a fire department web site; it isn't a "my space" page.
- o And while picking sites apart, here's a checklist of things that I personally do not like: Dancing flames, a little fire truck that comes out and extinguishes a house fire then drives away, just about ANY clip art you got from another site, simulated Fire Scene tape, the aforementioned way files, Firehouse's ticker (he he), .gif files when you should be using .jpg files, flat flashing lights, and maybe the dumbest of all: the National Security Threat Status.

o Remember: less is more. Use some restraint. If you think it's "cool", you may be the only one.

Maybe next convention we should hold a FD web site class?



Early Raleigh Apparatus

Toward the end of the 19th Century, Raleigh's volunteer firefighters operated these types of apparatus, among others. The **hand reel** was also called a jumper reel. One end was connected to the hydrant and the hose was laid right to the fire. Next, the **hand engine**, also called a hand tub. The Victor Company used one of these, and from this manufacturer, until the 1880s or so. They would also pull a hand reel to the scene, with hose for the hand line(s). The suction hose was a fixed attachment. Hand-drawn **hook and ladder trucks** were used until about 1890. The type shown is both front and rear steer, which may or may not have been the type used in Raleigh. The images are from a Rumsey and Company reproduction catalog from 1878, available at a cool site called <u>Handtub Junction</u>.



Two Champion chemical engines were operated, the small one hand-drawn and the larger one horse-drawn. They probably looked like these. And starting around 1890, hose wagons were utilized until the early 1910s. This wagon drawing is from the <u>US Patent Office</u>.

Municipal calculus compels the question: does the cost of accelerated environmental wear (on mostly but not exclusively reserve rigs), spread over a number of decades, surpass the one-time cost of constructing a giant carport? e.g., faded paint and gold leaf, UV deterioration of rubber parts, etc.

A shelter would provide a long term service time, where as you could use it for many years to come.

Yes, a big, honkin' car port could be used for decades to come. But would its construction cost be ultimately cheaper than the extra cost (whatever it is, however it is calculated) of storing said apparatus outdoors over all those years? That's what Powers That Be would ponder, I suspect.

Majority of our reserve fleet is parked in the single company stations. And during cold weather they park the ones at the shop inside their 3 double bays.

Jason is correct. There is additional/assumed information about this entry, notably that Raleigh has seven (or so) reserve engines, three reserve ladders (well, two platforms and one ladders), and one reserve rescue. Nearly all are housed at stations. When Station 28 opens next year, that facility will have three bays and will increase the department's indoor storage capacity accordingly. Raleigh's three antiques are also stored at the stations, the 1906 steamer (Station 8), the 1926 American LaFrance (Station 27), and the 1950 Mack (Station 25). I've also heard that two of the old Macks will be retained, one for preserving as an antique and one for parts.

The city of Raleigh has awarded the latest fire apparatus bid to Triad Fire, a Pierce dealer. The bids were for two rescue trucks (custom cab, non-walk-in body), one engine, and one 105-foot ladder. Timeframe for delivery is not known, but we would speculate 9 to 12 months.

Answer to frequent question/comment #1: The rescues will replace the department's two oldest units, presently operating as Rescue 14 and Rescue 19.

Answer to frequent question/comment #2: Weare not at this time aware of plans to increase staffing of either or both units. Nor does this fiscal year's budget indicate appropriations for such additional positions.

Answer to frequent question/comment #3: We are not aware of the department's long-term plans for additional aerial apparatus, and if future apparatus will be "sticks" versus "platforms."

Thats great raleigh has finally decided to go with true rescue trucks. Im glad to see that the new chief is making great progress in a positive direction.



This Blog vs. That Forum

As the comments to the Apex entries indicate, we're attempting to redirect any detailed discussion of this incident to the local Watch Desk forums. Whether it takes remains to be seen. How does this blog differ from that forum (and similar discussion boards)?

Blog: Only Mike can start topics.

Watch Desk (WD): Anyone can start topics.

Blog: Anyone can post comments.

WD: Ditto.

Blog: Registration NOT required.

WD: Registration required.

Blog: Users choose their screen name per posted comment. **WD**: Users choose their screen name at time of registration.

Blog: Users can hide their identity, or choose semi-private screen names such as CFP-___.

WD: Ditto.

Blog: Users can NOT edit their comments after posting (though they can contact Mike and request changes).

WD: Users can edit their comments after posting, but only their last comments or perhaps until someone posts a comment to the topic. Still figuring that out.

Blog: Mike can (and often does) edit the original topic after posting.

WD: Users who start topics can edit their original topic after posting, until someone posts a comment to the topic.

Blog: Mike reads every posted comment and babysits as necessary, notably removing or changing criticism directed at specific individuals, agencies, or organizations. Let someone else wrestle with libel law. Anonymous trash talk is removed as well.

WD: The forum has a moderator who presumably takes action in worst-case scenarios.

Blog: Mike performs other edits on comments at times, such as fixing spelling or typing errors from certain, ah, repeat offenders.

WD: Not performed.

Blog: Postings and comments can be viewed by anyone with access to the Internet.

WD: Ditto.

Blog: Forum has one single fall guy (Mike) who could be blamed, or at least targeted for criticism, for anything bad or perceived bad that happens as a result of his or other people's comments.

Found this description of Raleigh's first steam fire engine, as appeared in an 1870 newspaper: The engine has an upright tubular boiler, containing 315 inch and a quarter tubes, 16 inches long. Boiler and steam cylinder and covered with German silver. Dome and mouldings [sic] are Princess metal, smokestack German silver, all the iron work is polished; the pumps are cast, and gun metal and highly polished; air vessels and vacuum chambers are copper, burnished and surmounted with a handsome Princess metal signal lamp, side glass blue, with the words "Rescue 1" engraved thereon, back glass white, front light red, with the figure of a fireman descending a ladder with a child in his arms. Two handsome lamps, with side red and white glass, with the word "One" engraved. The front of the Engine is mounted with a Princess metal and German water-tank--brass rope reel--an iron hand tongue--hung on gum and valute [sic] springs--hind wheels 60 inches--front 54 inches-painted maroon striped with gold, blue and white, with a brake and two glass hand lamps.

The State Fair Fire Brigade is, alas, no more. Western Wake Fire Rescue has been contracted to solely provide 24/7 coverage that started yesterday (Sunday) and is running through the 22nd. Four personnel are on duty until the 13th, after which the numbers increase to 12 during the day and 6 at night.



Apparatus are Engine 196, Tanker 198, Brush 299, and two golf carts designated Car 19 and Car 29. They will be dispatched as "State Fair Fire." They're also based in the same place as last year, beside the Village of Yesterday as well as Gate 11 (tanker only). They'll be handling all inspections, EMS, fire, rescue, and haz-mat needs. Basically, they're operating a third station for about two weeks. And they can eat Fair food at every meal.

I actually thought that the Fairgrounds FD had been deactivated several years ago. To raise a question though, why wouldn't RFD engine 14 be given that responsibility, or why not have the city provide protection for the event?

Fairgrounds FD and YRAC FD's merged into the department known now as Western Wake Fire Rescue, the NC State Fairgrounds (along with some of the surrounding area) lie within their fire district, not within the City of Raleigh, so they actually have an obligation to provide protection as they do the other 350 days of the year. Firefighters from their own department as well as surrounding departments will be used to staff the trucks at the fair. They will continue to operate their other two stations as normal during the fair. To address as to why E-14 doesn't cover it, simple it's not in their district and it requires more than a 3-4 man engine company. And to boot E-8 is actually closer.

In 1957, a volunteer fire department was organized to protect the unincorporated areas of Raleigh around Western Boulevard and Hillsboro Street. The department was named Western Boulevard Fire Department. After most of its territory was annxed by the city in 1960, its members reorganized as the Fairground Fire Department. The station was relocated to a state-owned (?) site on Blue Ridge Road, across from the State Police complex. In 1998, the Fairgrounds (now plural) Fire Department and the Yrac Fire Department merged and formed the Western Wake Fire Department.

Fires during the time of the State Fair were answered both by the above departments and, if large enough, by the Raleigh Fire Department. In the late 1960s, a dedicated fire brigade was established during the time of the State Fair. It consisted of off-duty firefighters from Raleigh, among other individuals. Their first apparatus was a pumper borrowed from Garner. In more recent decades, they used apparatus loaned by

regional dealers. Or apparatus slated for sale by a department. Such one of the Six Forks Mack pumper-tankers that was for sale at the time. **Legeros** - 10/09/06 - 22:09

...and though the fairgrounds is already covered by WWFD, the State Fair sees an obvious value in paying for additional on-site personnel and equipment. They get a faster response, and higher level of protection and safety.

Durham Highway VFD was originally located along what was then the Durham Highway (now Glenwood Avenue), but now is located far from the actual 'Durham Highway'.

I guess Swift Creek sounded better than 'Macedonia', which was the name of the area where Tryon Rd split into Holly Springs Rd and Apex-Macedonia Rd, and Cary-Macedonia Rd came to. The names of some of the country's EMS/fire/rescue units has always interested me. The one that comes to mind is Frog Level VFD and Frog Level Rescue in Virginia.

For a few decades now, those documenting the early history of the Raleigh Fire Department cited 1851 as the last year that hand engines were purchased by the city. The machines were named the Rescue and the Excelsior and two new fire companies took those names. The next new pumping engine cited was the Rescue steam engine, delivered in 1870. The Victor Company, however, still operated a hand engine until the 1890s. An annual report from 1891 identified the hand engine as made by Rumsey, a shortened version of the name Rumsey and Company.

These facts seemed fine for Mike, who started his historical research a few years ago. The last hand engines were purchased in 1851, and one of them was still seemingly used as late as 1891. No problem. Fast-forward to this summer and Mike was again immersed in research. Combing through a newfound cache of local documents, he discovered a reference to a fire in 1871. As an ice house burned, the hand engine of the Mechanics Fire Company No. 2 stopped working. They soon abandoned the engine and dissolved the fire company. It was said to have been left in the street.

Also at this time, Mike found that the Hook and Ladder Company had an earlier truck than the one obtained in 1890. An earlier piece of apparatus was purchased in 1872. Between the failed hand engine, and the replacement hook and ladder truck, Mike started thinking. Would the second 1851 engine really have continued working past 1871, into the 1880s and even into the 1890s? It didn't make sense. Mike had also started searching for images of Rumsey and Company hand engines on the Internet. What he found were considerably larger rigs than the "small engines" described as obtained in 1851.

The next piece of the puzzle was found at <u>Handtub Junction</u>, a web site about hand engines. Rumsey and Company, they note, produced hand engines from 1863-1890. Thus, the Rumsey engine cited in the city's 1891 annual report could not have been built in 1851. With this piece of information, Mike started reading newspapers. If the Mechanics Company 1851 hand engine failed in 1871, it stood to reason that the city's other 1851 hand engine was replaced around the same time. And since Mike was researching the Raleigh Fire Department from 1867 forward, he started that year and worked his way forward.

Glued to a microfilm machine at the Olivia Raney local history library, Mike methodically paged through filmed issues of the *Daily Standard*, the *Daily Sentinel*, and other newspapers. He focused on the "local" section of each paper, watching for mention of fire topics as well as the minutes of the City Commissioners meetings. It was slow going, requiring an hour or two per newspaper year. Plus the time to scan individual articles, which numbered over 250 by the time he was reading issues from 1873. That was today, and that's where he found the following entry in the city minutes recap: "Mr. Clawson, the City Treasurer, instructed to purchase for Victor Fire Company a No. 1 side-stroke hand engine [at a price] not to exceed \$1,500." Mystery solved.

...or not. Subsequent issues of that era's newspapers did not reflect a purchase of a new hand engine for the Victor Company. No news items indicating same, nor any of the customary parades that were conducted when a fire company placed a new piece of equipment in service. Researching forwarding, the following entry appeared in the recap of the city minutes from August of the next year: "[Committee] instructed to inquire into the practicability of obtaining a new hand engine for the Victor [Company]." So... something seemingly happened in 1873 that prevented the ordered purchase. Unfortunately, the remaining 1874 issues don't detail the delivery of a new engine. Worse, one of the dailies of the era is missing most of its issues from the second-part of 1874. Maybe there are clues in the 1875 papers, which will be read next. It never ends.

What have been the great fires of the State Fair? Here are a few:

October 15, 1946 - Raleigh Fire Department responds to 5:06 a.m. alarm. Two lines and 1,110 feet of hose are used.

October 10, 1958 - Tin cattle barn burns. Workers assist Western Boulevard and Raleigh firefighters. Fueled by 1,500 bales of straw inside the building, blaze takes two hours to control.

October 13, 1964 - Portable restaurant burns. Located between Dorton Arena and the Red Cross Lounge, the 50 by 100 foot eatery catches fire with around 6:20 p.m. Between 70 and 150 people are in the restaurant when the fire starts. First fire truck arrives at 6:32 p.m. Raleigh, Cary, and Apex respond as mutual aid. Fame of building collapses at 6:45 p.m. Damage is estimated at \$100,000. Fire is watched by thousands of spectators.

Other fires on the grounds, but not during the Fair:

September 22, 1962 - Three rows of display booths destroyed. Worker at Red Star Oil Company spots blaze in exhibition building. Firefighters, including two Raleigh units, bring blaze under control in less than 20 minutes.

September 29, 1965 - Concession stands burn. The 4 a.m. fire alarm sweeps through 315-foot stretch of stands. Public address system tower also gutted. Damage to stands is about \$25,000. Three units and 22 volunteer firefighters battle blaze. Raleigh Fire Department also responds with five men and a pumper.

Regarding Raleigh's volunteer hook and ladder company (circa 1870s), recalls a 1944 historical sketch: "As most of the houses, at that time, were constructed of wood, fire, if not promptly checked, would jump from house to house. To overcome this much work was done [using] the 'hook'. This hook resembled a large grab-hook and to it was attached about fifty feet of chain and a hundred or more feet of rope. The method used to sop the fire from spreading was to throw the hook through a window and then [have] all hands pull the house down. This, however, was seldom done without the consent of the owner. To the keep the owner remind of the willingness of the company, their slogan on a big sign was attacked to the [hand-pulled] truck and was 'SAY THE WORD AND DOWN COMES YOUR HOUSE!"

Fire Alarms in 1875

That year, the city of Raleigh was divided into four "fire divisions." The first division was north of Hargett and east of Fayetteville and Halifax streets. The second division was south of Hargett and east of Fayetteville streets. The third was west of Fayetteville and south of Hargett streets. The fourth was west of Fayetteville and north of Hargett streets. When a fire was reported, the city bell would chime one tap for the first division, two taps for the second division, and so on. Prior to these divisions, fire alarms were general alarms. Personnel gathered in the Market Square to learn the location of a fire. Unless, that is, there was an obvious red glow in the sky somewhere. Fire alarm boxes were added a decade later in 1888. The box locations were also tapped out on the city bell.

THE FIREMEN'S TEST.—The Grand Firemen's Test last evening on the city lot, on Davie street, created great excitement, and not less than two thousand people were present to witness the contest. Two rudely constructed buildings filled with waste wood, shavings, &c., saturated with a barrel of keroseoe oil, were ignited at the same time, and the Rescue and Victor engines and the 'Phœnix' chemical machine, each engine distant from the fire about a half mile, were to rush to the scene, run out their hose, and each play upon the two burning buildings. The Rescue and Victor competing against the new chemical engine.

engine.

The Victor, one of the bestifre companies in the South, was of course first at the scene and had their house nearly put out before the other two came up. The Rescues were next to the scene and put in a beautiful stream on the same building which the Victors were playing upon. The Phoraix next appeared with its chemical fluid on the building, then completely wrapped in fismes. The strong streams of the Victor and Rescue had the effect of subduling their buildings at once, but we observed with much gratification, that though the Phoraix was a few moments behind hand, there was not a spark left when it got through, while the timbers of the other buildings were still burning.

Our opinion is, from the test last evening that the chemical engine is a success and as it can reach any and every part of the city where the Rescue and Victor would be of no service, that our Board of Aldermen should adopt it.

With this valuable addition, our Pire Department would be complete, and not complete without it. The Phienix Fire Company has been very recently organized, in fact, hardly organized, have just received their engine, many of them never saw it before last evening, and knew nothing as to how it operated. We therefore say that while it did well in the test last evening, yet we do not think it was a fair and equal test for for the Phoenix.

P. S.—Since writing the above, in which we were very liable to be mistaken as the night was dark, and the companies approached from different directions, and our eye-sight not very good, we learn that the Phornx were first on the spot and threw the first stream. The Phornx, with their chemical engine, undoubtedly put out their fire first, though the Rescue turned its stream on their building, which may have helped them out

The following is the official report of the committee:

Bell tapped at 8:15: the Chemical ar-

Bell tapped at 8:15; the Chemical arrived at 8:16, and struck at 8:16; the Victor arrived at 8:17, and struck at 8:18; the Rescue arrived at 8:18, and struck at 8:20.

Rescue arrived at 8:18, and struck at 8:20.

The committee is of the opinion that the Victor checked the flames of their fire first, and if they had taken the precaution of pulling down and scattering their pile sooner, as was done by the other compenies, instead of playing on it as a mass, it would have been extinguished first.

would have been extinguished first.

The Rescue, upon arrival, first attacked the fire played upon by the Victor: but soon turned their stream on the fire played on by the Chemical; this fire was finally extinguished a minute or so sooner than the one upon which the Victor played its stream. The fires seemed to be extinguished at 8:29.

Fire Alarm, 1884

From the *News & Observer* on July 13, 1884, in their typically punchy tone of the time: "An alarm of fire at 8:15 yesterday evening gave every boy in town an opportunity to scream fire, and these opportunities were eagerly grasped and diligently improved without exception. A slight fire in a kitchen back of the Prairie building on Wilmington street was the occasion of the racket. This was put out by the neighbors, however, so quickly that the 'musheens' did not have a chance to damage anything with their water, though they were ready for action more promptly even than usual. The damage by fire was inconsiderable."

Also, kitchens were typically detached structures, making those fires less damaging when they occurred. Detached kitchens reduced the risk of fires and kept the main structure free of cooking heat and odors.

From the *News & Observer* on March 26, 1885, quoting the Henderson *Gold Leaf* account of their largest fire since 1870: "Our task in connection with detailing the events at the fire would not be complete without alluding to the very commendable action of Maj. John C. Winder, general manager of the Raleigh & Gaston Railroad, and the fire department of Raleigh. As soon as the fire and probable extent of it became known in Raleigh, two companies loaded their apparatus on a flat car, and by order of Maj. Winder an engine was fired up and a special train by which this branch of the Raleigh fire department could have been run to Henderson in a very short time was held in readiness, subject to the demand of Mayor Cooper. Such action was commendable indeed, and while their services were not called for, on account of the inefficiency of the water supply, etc., the people of Henderson feel a deep sense of gratitude to Maj. Winder and the Raleigh fire department for their prompt and kind action."

For those who haven't seen same, here's yesterday's <u>WTVD story on fire departments</u>, fire insurance rates, and (gasp!) the relationship therein. You can also discuss on <u>their forums</u>.

The media makes it seem so easy to make our departments 10x better! All we have to do is request more money from the county commissioners and just like that, our insurance rating drops 2 points ... I wish I had known it was that easy. I bet if we ask the commissioners for a hydrant too, they can just plop one of those in the ground for us on every street corner.

In all seriousness though, we're in a losing battle with the media. We can't please anyone until they find that \$600 for fire insurance wasn't that big of a deal when their home is saved.

By the way, their information on insurance ratings is a little bit behind the times (Hipex, Dutchville, Alert, Ten Ten, Furina, Wakette, Wakelon, and all the rural stations).

The insurance info shows insurance district names, not fire department names. But, either way, some of them were still outdated.

From the last time I saw a Wake County ISO district map, each of these names was still recognized as an insurance district. Wouldn't ALERT have made more sense than Eastern Wake?? You are what you are...

Being that we are in EASTERN WAKE COUNTY the name just makes since, there are SEVERAL fire depts in NC that have different insurance names than their dept names, but hey there are what they are......

Beach - 11/20/06 - 02:10

The reason that some rural fire insurance districts have different names than nearby municipal fire insurance districts is that two fire insurance districts could not have the same name.

So, back in the day in Zebulon, the municipal fire insurance district was named Zebulon. This district was protected by the Zebulon (Municipal) Fire Department, which was organized in the 1920s. When the Zebulon Rural Fire Department was organized in the 1950s, their fire insurance district was named Wakelon. The name is presumably a blend of Zebulon and Wakefield, the name of the nearby community.

The Apex rural district was named Hipex.

The Fuquay-Varina rural district was named Furina.

The Garner rural district was named, if I recall, St. Mary's.

The Holly Springs rural district was named, gasp, Holly Springs Rural. This is because Holly Springs Rural preceded Holly Springs Municipal. In the 1990s, when a Holly Springs municipal district was created, it was likely simply named Holly Springs. Same thing for Morrisville.

The Knightdale rural district was named Alert.

The Wake Forest rural district was named Wakette.

The Wendell district was named Wendell-Holmes.

Western Wake's district was a merger of Fairgrounds and Yrac, with Yrac a reverse spelling of Cary.

Bay Leaf operates as a merger of themselves and Six Forks, though the Six Forks fire insurance district appears still on the maps.

Stony Hill was originally named Stoney Hill, and the insurance district retains the original spelling.

Fairview was originally named Ten Ten, after Ten Ten Road, and the insurance district retains the original name.

Wake-New Hope was named as such as there were other New Hope Fire Departments in the state. Incorporation years, from the Secretary of State web site: 1953 (Gaston?), 1956 (Wayne County), 1956 (Wake County), 1973 (Orange County), 1976 (Randolph County).

These separate municipal and rural districts are the reasons that so many volunteer fire departments that served or were based in municipalities had "city trucks" and "rural trucks." The town would purchase fire equipment that could be used within the city limits. The volunteers would raise money and purchase fire equipment that could be used both inside and out. Some times these two departments shared the same stations. Some times they had separate stations. There were usually two rosters, two chiefs, etc.



Fire Commission Meeting / Western Wake Station Closing

One of the agenda items at last night's Wake County Fire Commission meeting was "Report on Evaluation and Application of Fire Commission's Closure Criteria - Western Wake Fire Station 2." The report, however, was NOT presented. Officials returning from Western Wake, where the presentation was also made that evening to their Board of Directors, related that the Board (a.) had quite a few questions about the data contained in the report and (b.) requested that the report not be presented to the Fire Commission until those data questions had been addressed. Thus we have no report data nor report recommendations to share at this time. However, here's some context around the issue of station closings.

Station locations have been an issue for examination since 1994, when a comprehensive county fire service study was released. That study recommended station closures. Ongoing municipal annexations, a 2003 Fire/EMS Capital Facility and Equipment Study, and the Fire Commission's adopted Long Range Business Plan have continued to compel the evaluation of station locations. To address the issue of station closures, the Fire Commission's Facility Committee developed a station closure criteria. This criteria was adopted by the Fire Commission on July 15, 2004. Basically, the criteria recommends CONSIDERATION of a station closure proposal if either (a.) there's a measurably better service at the same cost or (b.) if the same service can be provided at less cost. Observe that reduced service is not an option. And, as expected, measurements of service include staff levels, response time, and ISO grade.

The next regularly scheduled Fire Commission meeting is January 18, 2007.

The historical perspective on station closings due to municipal annexation impact include:

Six Forks Road (later just Six Forks, later merged with Bay Leaf), opened in 1956, moved farther north in 1962, and moved even farther north and west in 1974

Western Boulevard, opened in 1957, closed in 1960, and reformed as Fairground (later Fairgrounds, later merged with Yrac to form Western Wake) in 1961.

Durham Highway, opened in 1965, and moved north and west in the 1980s. They opened Station 2 in 1976, then closed Station 1 in the 1980s. They opened the present Station 1 in 1992. In 2000, Raleigh Station 23 opened at the Station 2 location.

Thank goodness for the Western Wake auto aid, as Cary seemingly doesn't include map book numbers any more. Couldn't tell the street name from the human voice. Wrengate? Westgate? Retgate? Locution wasn't much help on pronunction, either, but the map number was magic.

To the best of my knowlage, Cary has never given map page numbers on dispatch. They have MDT's (Mobile Data Terminals) on all their trucks with Map Proviewer and Dispatch info. They do not need map numbers given to them on dispatch when the computer gives them all the info needed on dispatch. They even have hydrant locations by address in the computers.

I don't know what is going to happen to auto aid now that Western Wake Station 2 is closing. I guess Cary can't give them enough call volume to keep that station alive anymore. With closest station dispatch, I guess Swift Creek, Apex, and Morrisville will have to fill the void.

they are used as truck companies on calls carrying high angle rescue equipment, ground ladders, TIC's and salvage equipment. They also carry the mobile air compressors and fill stations. They respond to residential fire alarms and gas leaks v. an aerial, and any fuel spill/haz mat call. An aerial responds with the engine to commercial gas leaks and fire alarms.

However if there is a call where an aerial is much closer than one of the trucks then the aerial will normally take the call.

For a structure fire call you get:

- 2 Engines
- 1 Ladder
- 1 Truck
- 1 Rescue
- 1 Auto Aid Engine
- 2 Batt Chiefs

A good working fire could bring another engine, truck, ladder or rescue as deemed by the IC. The layout for 2nd and 3rd alarms is still being worked on.

The trucks and ladders are interchangeable once on-scene as far as fire ground operations go. They also run the EMS calls out of the stations

This 1974 Caddy appeared in today's traditional pre-Thanksgiving Christmas parade as part of the Wake EMS procession. The former Raleigh Ambulance Service unit is a gem both inside and out, as a certain photographer can attest. (Mike hitched a ride to the staging area.) First served at a funeral home in Wake Forest, correct? Going in style, indeed.



If memory serves, it was used by Bright Funeral Home. I even saw it on a few 9-1-1 calls with or without Wake Forest Rescue. There was another funeral home in Wake Forest, Lewis, that provided an older version to the rescue squad. It was a '65 or '67. The only other rescue squad owned coach that I remember was a mid-50's Pontiac used by Apex Rescue. There were, however, big cars used in Johnston County. Selma had an early 60's cadillac that then went to Micro in the mid 70's. Smithfield (then Johnston County Civil Defense Rescue Service) also used a mid 70's Pontiac (a raised roof version). Johnston Memorial Hospital operated it's own ambulances for years, as well. They had a high-top Cadillac and a high-top Pontiac. Johnston Ambulance got the Cadillac, which has since been sold. The first owner of the old Mid-South Ambulance got the Pontiac.

There were also several of the cars used in Raleigh and elsewhere in Wake County as ambulances. Apex Funeral Home had a white Oldsmobile, Bright Funeral Home had their white Caddys, and Screws & Hudson Funeral Home in Zebulon had one, I believe. Beacon Ambulance (WCEMS' predecessor had several Pontiacs, Cadillacs, and Oldsmobiles) that they ran emergency calls with. Some had raised roofs, others were like the one pictured above.

Beacon changed their name to Medical Transport Service, and they also operated Pontiacs (2), a Cadillac (1), and an Oldsmobile (1). Gray Funeral Home also operated several cars, including a 1969 Cadillac, a 1972 Cadillac, a 1973 Cadillac, and a 1969 Pontiac. There was also another ambulance service that operated around Wendell and Zebulon that operated a mid-60's Cadillac, I just cannot remember the name.

How's the Spam Factor (SF), you ask, for someone whose had his name and e-mail address plastered across the internet for years? When "mike at legeros dot com" debuted in the late 1990s, spam was rare or maybe unheard of. Mike's address was direct linked from his web pages, all of them. It also accompanied all of his USENET postings, primarily https://example.com/thick-a-week movie reviews, his major pastime for several years. (For years, each week brought new questions about old movies. Now, each week brings new questions about fire engines or https://example.com/thick-a-week movie reviews, his major pastime for several years.

Spam started increasing, then really increased, until a few years ago, the above address was being flooded. Dozens of messages on a daily basis. Filtering was tried but finally abandoned in favor of an all new address, "mikey at legeros dot com." Direct links to the new address were removed and a web page created that spelled the thing in text. Until a year or so ago, an automatic reply to anyone sending mail to the old address. This was itself problematic, however, as Spam is often sent from valid HIJACKED addresses. Thus, Mike was adding to the problem. Presently, mail to Mike's old address just disappears. And how much junk mail is that? Hundreds of messages per HOUR.

As for the "mikey" address, spam is appearing at a rate of about a dozen messages a day. When it gets worse, Mike's address will change again.

How's the new camera working out? Two things are particularly confounding these days. First, remembering to set the ISO. Too many day shots are accidentally shot at 800 or 1600 ISO. Just need a sticker on the back of the camera for that. Second and more problematic are too many slightly tilted shots. User error? Misaligned sensor? Haven't fully investigated that one just yet. Let's see... processing time takes forever and then some. Shooting in RAW has so many advantages, EXCEPT for the torturously long time it takes the Canon DPP software to process and export a couple hundred images, which is typical for what Mike shoots. Canon RAW files are also very large, so they're reviewed and deleted using IrfanView (excellent image viewer) prior to transferring from the memory card. Otherwise, so far so good.

What will the county and the fire protection therein look like in, say, twenty years? Looking at these <u>county fire service maps</u>, a couple predictions come to mind. First, municipal expansion will continue (duh), and from both inside and outside Wake County. Such as Durham creeping eastward. Will every square-inch of land be annexed by someone or someone else within 20 years? Doubt that. Thus, rural districts will remain, and probably in the greatest number from the northeast to the southwest. Second, donut holes will probably still be a problem. So let's throw that into our prognostication engine. Third, stations will open, close, and merge as they always have. Fourth, with each new generation of firefighters and fire chiefs, the traditional resistance to change will change for the better.

So where does that leave us, looking a double decade forward?

North of Raleigh and west of Wake Forest, one or more of the private departments will still be around. Most likely still around? Bay Leaf or Stony Hill. Least likely? Falls. On the northeast side of the county, Wake Forest and Rolesville will handle handle. And maybe with Franklin County encroaching from the north. Due east, and outside Raleigh and Rolesville, there'll remain another good-sized chunk of unincorporated area. Again, probably one or more private departments will still be around. There's also the <u>Little River Reservoir</u> planned north (or is it north east?) of Wendell that could shake things up, if developed as prime residential property. It'll also split some territory, require new resource arrangements on each side of the thing. (Estimated completion is 2025, so it'll be some years out...)

East of Garner, southeast of Raleigh, and south of Knightdale / Wendell / Zebulon, there's another area that will need protection. Eastern Wake will probably be around for a while. There are also potential wildcards with GFD and WFD. Both are private-run departments. If either town elects to run those FDs themselves, the options would be limited to (a.) department fully merges into town, (b.) department partially merges into town, and (c.) department doesn't merge into town and operates independently, while town creates its own, second department.

South of Garner and east of Fuquay will be another unincorporated area of probably reasonably good size. Will Johnston County creep into the picture from the east? South of Raleigh but north of Fuquay, and east of Cary, and west of Garner, is probably a shrinking mass. Will both Swift Creek and Fairview have territory in 20 years, or perhaps have merged?

West of Fuquay and southwest of Holly Springs will stay protected by those towns. Anything around the nuclear plant will probably stay rural, e.g. not annexed. Especially if the plant expands. Due west of Apex and west of Cary will undoubtedly be annexed and stay protected by those towns. North of Cary, any remaining rural areas will be protected by Morrisville. West of Raleigh but east of Cary, contract fire protection for donut holes is probably more likely than anything else. Then again, maybe Western Wake will still be around in 20 years.

So, outside of municipalities, it's a safe prediction that rural FDs will remain in northern Wake, northeastern Wake, southeastern Wake, and mid-southern Wake. Or perhaps the FDs will exist as a single county entity. If the latter, resources could be deployed with greater flexibility. Such as combination stations, where a municipality and WCFD share a facility. Or roaming manpower units, that respond to working fires with a handful of paid personnel.

Indeed, a future so bright you had better wear shades!

There is talk about EW to get another station on the south side of there district just a rocks throw away from the JC line to cover some of the no man's land. I believe Garner is has plans as well.



How quickly could hand engines be put to work, back in the day? - Garner's 1961 Chevy tanker was one of Hopkins first units.
- Holly Springs 1990s bucket truck conversion, from CP&L, went to Swepsonville FD.
- Knightdale's first pumper, a 1942 GMC, went to Bear Pond FD in Vance County.
- Knightdale's first ladder, a 1991 E-One, went to Selma.
- Raleigh's first rescue, a 1954 GMC panel, went to Zebulon Rescue, then Hopkins FD.
- Raleigh's 1957 FWD pumper was bought by Knightdale Tractor, then loaned to Hopkins FD as their first pumper.
- Raleigh's 1975 Chevy rescue went to RPD. One of Raleigh's two 1991 Chevy rescues also went to RPD.
- Raleigh's 1979 Mack / 1958 American LaFrance tiller went to Wendell, and was recently sold to a department near Wilmington.
- Raleigh's Mack CF pumpers have been scattered far and wide, including one in service in Knightdale, and one recently sold to Four Oaks FD.
- Six Forks' first pumper, a 1950s front-mount, went to Falls FD as their first pumper.
- Six Forks' 1961 International pumper went to the NC Zoo as their first fire engine.

Morrisville's heavy rescue went to clayton,

Apex's ladder 1 went to calbash,

Eastern wake ladder 4 went to somewhere in nash county.

Raleigh's 1922 ALF service truck had its ladder body removed in 1960, for use on a newer service truck. The rest of the vehicle sat outside behind Station 8 before being disposed.

Raleigh's 1925 ALF pumper sat in Pullen Park for years before being privately purchased and parked outside at Shady Knoll Mobile Home Estates on Highway 64. It was offered for sale again in 1974.

Raleigh's second 1926 ALF pumper was wrecked on November 14, 1952. One of the injured FFs later died as a result of his injuries.

Raleigh's 1936 ALF pumper was privately purchased by someone in the area, but sat outside and turned to junk.

Raleigh's 1939 ALF / 1916 tiller sat outside and rotted behind Station 8 before being disposed in the early 1980s (I believe).

On November 30, 1886, a large cotton fire compelled Raleigh officials to contact the Goldsboro Fire Department. The telegram requested that they "hold themselves in readiness" in the event aid was needed. In Goldsboro, a special train was ordered ready and within twenty minutes, a telegram was received in Raleigh stating that the fire engines were aboard the train and ready to roll. Their assistance was ultimately not needed. Some 1,000 bales burned that afternoon, worth about \$50,000. Some of the cotton was still burning after two weeks.

Who else has come to Raleigh's aid in the past? Durham and Smithfield each sent engines when the Yarborough House burned in 1928.

The apparatus in the state consisted of 18 steamers, 13 other engines, 16 hook and ladder trucks, 51 hose carriages and wagons, 1,468 active members, 30 horses, 39,700 feet of serviceable hose, 23 non-electric alarm systems, 3 electric alarm systems, and 50 alarm boxes. The water supplies included 713 hydrants and 81 miles of pipe. These numbers were based on reports from 31 locales, though 5 reported no fire protection at all.

Pranks are a traditional component of the fire service. 2. Pranks also serve one or more purposes in the fire service. 3. Pranks are commonly cited as serving the purpose of stress relief, and helping fire service members release or perhaps adapt to the stressors associated with the fire service. 4. Pranks could also be cited as serving to build or sustain a sense of community within the fire service. 5. Both stress relief and community building are important aspects of the fire service. 6. Can stress relief and community building be facilitated more effectively with means other than pranks? 7. If yes, what are those means and how has the fire service fared using them? 8. If no, what is the present-day definition of acceptable versus unacceptable with regard to pranks? Opine as desired. Corrections or perspectives to the above logic is invited. If desired, here is some random reading on the <u>psychology of persuasion</u>.

Something I've been exposed to lately (in Charlotte) are "Station Christmas Videos." The title is pretty much self-explanatory but I'll explain further. Basically, the department videographer for Charlotte FD tapes a Christmas Video for a Station. It is up to the station to come up with the idea for their video, but for the most part they are very comical (as FFs are not the greatest actors) and tend to jokingly make fun of other stations in the city. Those videos are edited, etc. and then played on the CFD training TV channel for all stations to view.

I see this as a great opportunity for stress-relief, comic-relief, and building of camaraderie. All the videos are made in good, clean fun and are also a good way to wish everyone on the department a Happy Holidays (in a fun way).

Fire Station 32 is the "other" haz-mat station in the city. FS32 houses the RRT unit as well as HM-Engine 32. In the video, a FF from 32 "gets the call" to finally become a "Varsity" Haz-Mat team member. All in all, it's a very comical video that is very well done.

When the city changed from trucks to ladders, the new designation was FL22. That presented a problem because Locution then thought this was a Falls unit, since it started with FL. THEREFORE, the RFD units were renamed with RF as the agency identifier. Since most all of the newly changed units (especially the Ladder companies), hadn't been recorded by Locution, they all became "Check pager for units". The setting was changed to spell them out until the were recorded by Locution, to avoid the "check pager". Hope this clears up some of the whys.



We're approaching the one year anniversary of this blog, which was started on December 27, 2005. What have we learned about ourselves and others? .

- More people post anonymously than not. This is not a surprise, and not necessarily a bad thing. It keeps conversation focused on the issue versus the participants. Nor will things come back to haunt folks. Stuff posted on the Internet can live a LONG time.
- Babysitting is sometimes necessary. Every so often a series of comments gets out of hand. After one particularly heated thread-originating from an incorrect interpretation of a scene photo-- we put some rules in place. No talking trash, period, if you post anonymous. Some talking trash, maybe, if you use your real name. No personal attacks on people, or particular organizations. And so far so good. People are playing nice.
- Users, at least the regular responders to topics, appear to LOVE the format of a moderated discussion forum that allows anonymous
 postings and is registration-free. This perspective is based on both user feedback and the seeming under-usage of both the Watch Desk
 and FireNews forums.
- There's always stuff happening in the local fire service scene, and thus there's always information to relate. Promotions, retirements, safety initiatives, major incidents, station plans, apparatus purchases, meeting reports, ceremony accouchements, live burns, multiagency drills, and so on. Tell US about them, and we'll spread the word. Or even show up and take pictures.
- The biggest issue for everyone appears to be closet unit dispatch and/or response. Runners-up range from a county-wide numbering scheme to "will Raleigh ever run a fully-staffed heavy rescue company?"
- Usage of blog: 4,838 visits last month, or about 156 per day. 39,019 visits this year, or about 780 per week, or about 111 per day
- How many individual blog readers are there? Unknown, and unable to determine. Probably dozens.

This year, 197 incidents or events were posted to <u>Mike's photo site</u>. The split was 108 shot by Mike and 89 shot by Lee. The numbers do not include links to Lee's photo site, which started in September, a couple months after <u>his photo site</u> premiered. Links to Lee's site, versus hosting the photos, commenced in September.

The totals of posted images numbered about 7,500. The split was about 3,800 shot by Lee and 3,700 shot by Mike. As noted above, Lee's images were posted through September.

Dividing the latter by the former, the average number of posted images per incident or event was 38.

Usage of Mike's photo site: 6,258 visits to the main page last month, or about 200 per day. 68,114 visits to the main page this year, or about 1,360 per week.

What was posted? Lots and lots of fires, including a number shot by both Lee and Mike: the major fire on Newton Road on 1/7, Bush Street on 1/19, Yancey Street on 2/1, Timberwood Drive on 3/16, the MF on Green Road on 4/3, the MF on Martin Street on 4/16, the MF on Lanier Club Drive and the working fire on Parker Croft Court during the storms on 4/22, the MF on Hempshire Place on 6/23, the MF on Banks Hill Row on August 4, the fatal MF on Rose Lane on 8/6, and the MF on Mill Village Road on 9/26.

There were also lots of wrecks, a number of drills, a number of new deliveries, some station photos, some station construction photos, some haz-mat incidents, a couple promotional ceremonies, the tabletop simulator at the Keeter Training Center, the tower dedication at the Keeter Training Center, the State Fireman's Association convention, the Fallen Firefighter's Foundation monument dedication, the June 14 flooding, the RFD mobile command post, the State Fair, the MS boot drive, and the Raleigh Christmas Parade. Back when—all ambulances were inspected by the state. The department with this task was the same department that did sanitary inspections. They had two inspectors for the state—Art Lamson and Ben Shephard—There were no EMT's and an inspection was for the units. It could be either a hurse or a rescue truck. Just needed to be clean and have one person who had taken Red Cross Advanced First Aid. About the time the state was starting to get interested in the EMS field, and a lot of the movement goes to Maxine Maurice at Wake ER, the state desided to hold an EMT class at Bowman Gray Hospital in Winston Salem, NC.

It would be for 50 people through out the state. This was just a trial because they did not know if there would be 50 people who wanted to take an 80+ hour class. Also it was during the day, Monday thru Friday.

Well, Wake county had two to enroll——Me (Fred Loy and Sunny Bridgers of the Raleigh Fire Dept.) I think Sunny is still on the Garner Fire Department.

This would make him one of the oldest EMT's in the state.

Another was Dwayne West from Johnston County. At that time he was working for a funeral home.

That's a three-month sample size. Divide the latter by the former and he averages about 44 photos per incident or event. Divided the latter by 12 and he averaged about 7 incidents or events a week.



Speaking of EMS vehicles, just how many hospital-operated units are there around Raleigh? Seems like there's a ton. WakeMed has a bunch, such as this Special Ops Support Unit. As was noted in an earlier blog posting, it carries a array of different equipment such as decon tents/showers, heaters, back boards, coveralls, etc.



WakeMed's fleet also includes the local SMAT trailer, another box-style truck, and several small cargo trailers which contain all sorts of equipment. They will soon be getting a tractor-trailer similar to the one Carolinas Medical Center's MedCenter Air operates (the one that deployed to Waveland, MS that houses the mobile operating room).

Raleigh is also a part of the Metropolitan Medical Response System, and several of the hospitals have trailers for this (white, with a blue stripe at the botttom with MMRS on it).

And that doesn't include the hospital-based ambulance fleets...

MED-1, as mentioned above, is owned by CMC (Carolinas Medical Center) and is staffed with Doctors/Nurses/Specialists from CMC and Paramedics/EMTs from MEDIC, and also members of SMAT. When deployed, special officers from CMPD (Char-Meck Police Dept) accompany them. These officers have the power to arrest in areas outside of Charlotte and NC. They serve as secuirty for the unit and as a liason between the unit and local authorities where they are deployed.

The "unit" is actually two 53' tractor trailers that, when set-up, have approx 1000 sq ft of indoor treatment space. It also includes a full pharmacy, lab, radiology department, and ultrasound capabilities. MED-1 is also able to handle small surgery procedures, dentist procedures, trauma patients, and everything in between. It is truly amazing how capable and advanced this unit is. If you ever get the chance to tour it, don't pass it up! By no means am I "ate up" by EMS stuff, but it is really cool to see how prepared this unit is to handle/assist whenever, where ever, for whatever it might be. It can handle hundreds of patients at a time, with roughly 15+ beds inside and 100 in an attached (climate controlled) tent, not counting the "walking wounded."

It would be great if WakeMed could get something similar together with similar functions/resources. Heaven forbid, if a major incident occured in NC, the two together would be an excellent resource for the State. In smaller cases, MED-1 could handle the western part of the state and WakeMed's unit could handle the eastern part; similar to USAR Teams and/or RRT. I'm not sure if SMAT already does something like that, I do know there is at least one trailer housed at a CFD station.





Historical trivia. In 1851, a fire destroyed more than 17 structures on Fayetteville, Hargett, and Wilmington Streets. The blaze, controlled by means including dynamite, inspired improvements in fire protection including the installation of underground water cisterns. Their locations included the northeast and southwest corners of the Capitol Building, along Fayetteville Street, and on Hargett Street near Wilmington Street. They had capacities between 4,000 and 6,000 gallons, which was fine for the hand-powered pumps of the time. The cisterns were filled with rainwater, piped from the gutters of adjoining buildings. Presumably they could also be manually filled using any well pumps that were nearby.

When Raleigh's first steam engine was delivered in 1870, officials discovered that the cisterns could be quickly depleted. The underground tanks was subsequently enlarged or replaced with larger versions, with capacities ranging from 13,000 to 34,000 gallons. Fire hydrants were installed in 1887, allowing the use of hydrant pressure for hoses instead of the steam engine. The hydrants could also be used as a water supply for the steamer. One hand engine remained in use, however. It may have continued to draw water from the cisterns.

At least a couple cisterns remained filled into the next century, as a precaution against water system failure. When the News & Observer building burned on April 24, 1913, a water main failed about 1:15 into the incident. Fire Chief Sherwood Brockwell directed the steam engineused at that time as reserve piece, or for major emergencies—to the intersection of Fayetteville and Davie Streets, to utilize one of the old cisterns.

Decades later, when Fayetteville Street was being converted from a beloved roadway to a despised pedestrian mall (editorial opinion added), workers uncovered one of the old cisterns. It is pictured below. After this discovery, we've heard, drivers were told to avoid parking aerial apparatus on the completed mall. Just in case. Need to verify that one. Alas, we never heard of any subsequent discoveries when the mall was recently demolished and the roadway reopened.
