The Raleigh Fire Department has a new investigation vehicle. This 2007 Ford F-350 was placed in service today at Station 9. It will service as the primary vehicle for Car 198. The new unit is equipped with a four-person cab, a camper shell, and a slide-out equipment/compartment tray. It was photographed at this morning's house fire on The Circle.

There are no plans to letter the vehicle any further. Unlike most of the fire department vehicles, the intend is to NOT be flashy with decals and striping. The reasoning behind this is prevent suspects or witnesses from fleeing a fire scene upon the arrival of an investigator. This is similar to why police detectives and ATF arson investigators utilize unmarked vehicles.

The van has been gutted and will probably be used by Services.

MTH, you are missing the point...it is not about being discreet. There would already be many fire trucks on the scene whenever an investigator arrives, so being discreet would be out of the question. The intent is to merely avoid advertising the arrival of investigators in hopes of not running off any potential witnesses.

The only reason the lighting was installed was to provide investigators the ability to respond in a timely manner. Have you ever tried to go from Station 20 to Station 28 at 5pm?

The new year has started tragically as <u>this NBC 17 story</u> reports. Oregon Hill Volunteer Fire Department member Paul Lewis Ellington, 36, died this morning while answering a call for a trailer fire, when his personal vehicle ran off the road. Funeral arrangements are incomplete. <u>WFMY-TV also has details</u>. The accident occurred on Crutchfield Road near Business 29 northeast of Reidsville.



My thoughts and prayers go out to the Ellington Family. Lets all PLEASE learn from this and drive careful and wear seatbelts, even in back of an Engine company. Be Safe.

Here's an interesting artifact, the <u>original county-wide numbering system</u> that was apparently implemented by the Wake County Firemen's Association. The document is dated April 30, 197_. Methinks the year is 1979, but others can verify. To view a longer and modern list of Wake County fire station numbers, see <u>this list on Carolinas Fire Page</u>. Wonder which fire stations were #1, #2, #3, #10, and #35? They're absent from the old list as well. Gone by that time was Western Boulevard Fire Department. Same for Wake Forest Fire Department #2. That's two possible candidates. Maybe Forestry was one? Maybe Raleigh Central was another??

The one on the CFP is the 'enhanced' version that takes into account all of the newer stations. The list as shown is from late 1979. That was the year we put '29' on the sides of our helmets at Yrac. I don't remember hearing anyone really say as to why there was no 1, 2, or 3. However, I notice that RFD, NCFS, and RDU are missing.

As I remember, Apex, Bay Leaf, Fairgrounds, Falls, F-V, Hopkins, Rolesville, Six Forks, Stoney Hill, Wake Forest, Wendell, Yrac, and Zebulon were the only ones that signed onto the idea. Cary used a modified version, dropping the '5' from everything, instead going with simply ENGINE 1, ENGINE 2, TRUCK 6, and BRUSH 9.

The rescue squads were already using something similar that coincided with the numbers assigned to the towns (and Six Forks).

(Example, Bay Leaf traded 15 to Rolesville since Rolesville rescue was 1571.) We were trying to solve the ID problem on the radio with everybody having an engine 1. We wanted to be more specific on the fire scene. It worked but now Wake County has confused the issue again with duplicate EMS/Fire numbers. I guess we were ahead of our time. Some liked it, some didn't. What has changed?



The first mini pumper, then called an "auxiliary truck" or a "squad truck" or simply a "squad," was a Dodge half-ton truck most likely of 1944 model year. Its equipment included a booster pumper, booster reel, water tank, and overhead ladder and suction hose rack. It operated from around the summer of 1944 until being destroyed in an accident with a Greyhound bus on September 12, 1947. The two firefighters operating the unit were both injured.



The second squad was a 1948 Ford F3. Purchased in FY48, it also was equipped with a booster pump, booster reel, and water tank. It also had an overhead ladder wrack. The truck was assigned two firefighters, and responded solo to small fires, and was also dispatched to all structure fires. It was housed at stations 1, 2, 3, 6, and 7 over the years. The squad was still in service into the 1970s. Don't know when it was removed from service, yet. Nor if it was staffed into its final years.

The fire department placed a brush truck in service by March 23, 1982. Called Brush 1, the 1965 International D120 was renamed Brush 3 by May 22, 1985. The light-duty truck had previous served as Foam 5, and as Maintenance 3. The unit was presumably unstaffed. Brush 3 was removed from service by August 18, 1986.

Three Chevrolet Silverado brush trucks were placed in service on August 18, 1986, at Stations 3, 9, and 17. Each was equipped with a 350 GPM pump, 200 gallon water tank, and twin booster reels. They cost \$24,000 each. The unstaffed units were named Mini 3, Mini 9, and Mini 17. They were utilized for brush fires, vehicle fires in parking decks, overnight fire watch after structure fires, storm response, off-road EMS response, towing trailers, and other special duties. Mini 17 towed a confined space rescue trailer housed at Station 17 for several years.

On March 14, 1997, one of the three mini-pumpers was destroyed in an accident on Lead Mine Road. On January 25, 2006, a third mini-pumper was again placed in service. The 2005 Ford-F550 truck was equipped with a Reading body and a Slagle pump unit. It was placed in service as Mini 3, though it operated from Station 2 for several months. During that period, the foam truck had been removed from service, and reserve foam was stored on a trailer with other haz-mat supplies at Station 2.

The mini pumpers have been assigned to Stations 3, 4, 9, 17, 23, and 24. Mini 3 has operated from 1986 to present. Mini 4 operated from 2000 to 2004, and from 2007 to present. Mini 9 operated from 1986 to 1997, from 1998 to 2000, and from 2006 to 2007. Mini 17 operated from 1986 to 1998. Mini 23 operated from 2004 to 2006. Mini 24 operated in 2004, and from 2006 to present.

The specific vehicle histories go something like this:

1986 Chevy #3 (shop #0010___) M9 in 1986 > Wrecked 1997

2005 Ford M3 in 2006

Looking at the lower left picture of the Chevy reminds me of many of the brush trucks built on p/u trucks. So many of them were WAY overloaded! Made them real interesting to drive, too. Definitely something you did not want to get into much of a hurry with. Seems like most of them had that tell-tale 'squat' in the back-end.

CompactFlash Recovery Software

Here's a tip for digital cameras with <u>CompactFlash (CF) memory cards</u>. Recovery software, such as <u>CardRecovery</u>, can recover deleted photos. It can also read a seemingly corrupted card. This has happened twice to Yours Truly with high-capacity (8GB, 16GB) memory cards. For regular deleted images, the software's great if you are a fast reviewer. Myself, prior to moving files from the camera to the computer, I review the images as stored on the card. It's a fast way to cycle through them. I delete as I go, and some times delete a keeper. Enter the software. It requires a bit of time to run, but it retrieves the picture that was seemingly deleted. In the second scenario, with a corrupted card, the software will recover many but not necessarily all photos. But when shooting with a high-capacity card, with dozens or hundreds of pictures taken, recovering some is certainly better than recovering none!

Interesting read. The author makes some good points, but I think he misses a few. Websites need to be kept relative. And they need to be kept current as well as serve a purpose. This is an ongoing purpose that unfortunately few agencies follow through on.

From the view-on-the-street perspective of a street paramedic, I view a lot of different websites looking for good information that I can use. Unfortunately, there are very few sources of this content available, mostly because what is out there is out of date. To all you webmasters out there, if you have not updated it in more than a month, your stuff is pretty much obsolete and 'old news'.

I'll take the concept of an emergency services agency website. If you're going to but bios up there, you need to have pictures. If you're going to put your fleet up there, you need to put up more than a couple of pictures- provide a 'tour' of your trucks. Put your SOPs and protocols up, but make sure they are kept updated. Show off, make a statement.

Put good info up there. Tell people about your agency. Make the site useful and relavant.

Highlights from tonight's meeting forthcoming.

Here are some highlights of last night's Fire Commission meetings. Corrections and clarifications welcome.

Regular Agenda

There was a presentation on the state's Domestic Preparedness and Readiness Regions (DPRR). These are new entities, created at the request of Homeland Security. Raleigh and Wake County reside in region 4, which is comprised of Wake, Chatham, Alamance, Orange, Durham, Person, Granville, Nash, Vance, and Warren Counties. There's a core committee from Wake County participating in planning, and they represent public health, municipal police, sheriff's department, municipal fire, rural fire, EMS, hospitals, emergency management, rescue, and public works.

A letter from the county attorney was presented, regarding facility and/or land ownership in cases where the county is investing a significant amount of money in construction or renovation of a fire station. This was an issue carried over from the last meeting, and the letter answered some questions (or at least reinforced answers given at the last meeting). The issues were raised at the prior meeting in regard to renovations of Bay Leaf Station #1.

The Facilities Committee (FC) chair presented a report containing several items, including a new plan for future fire station repairs and renovations and an update on dormitory renovations, and the impact of a recent fire code change that requires sprinklers in fire station structures.

Regarding future fire stations, two items were noted. Properties around Raynor Road are being examined for the southeastern Wake County fire station. There's also a 4,000-home housing development planned in Wendell in five years. The FC sees a need for a fire station, or likely fire/police/EMS facility there. They recommend planning for buying land, and adding construction costs to the CIP. The station would be built in five years.

Regarding the evaluation of fire stations for closure, the FC developed a method for ranking stations. They then applied this ranking method to every county fire station. Five met their criteria to be evaluated for closure. One is already set to close, Western Wake #2. The remaining are Bay Leaf #3, Falls, New Hope #1, and Western Wake #1. The FC requested that the four be evaluated at the same time, notably because all four could be covered by Raleigh. The next step is for the county to talk to the Raleigh Fire Department, and see if they're interested in contract coverage for one or more of the station areas.

The Compensation Committee chair presented a report with recommendations on funding retirement, longevity, and life insurance programs, for county fire departments that contract with the county.

The Apparatus Committee chair presented a pair of policy drafts, an administrative and small vehicle replacement policy, and a vehicle disposal policy. The latter requires departments to dispose of vehicles and apparatus within specific time frames after receiving replacement vehicles.

There was a presentation on the subject of the Fire Protection Service Tax District Long-Range Business Plan. The plan consisted of a binder containing documents including facility and staff recommendations already approved by the Fire Commission, a placeholder for an updated capital expenditures model (there were additional items approved that night), the original long-range business plan, and the compensation plan adopted by the Board of Commissioners in 2003.

The presentation resulted in a colorful and lengthy discussion about next steps. Some people thought the document was ready to present to the Board of Commissioners (BOC) in their February work session, as planned. Other people thought the document was not ready for presentation, and/or that they needed more time to review the document. A motion was made to accept the document, and proceed with plans to present same to the BOC. The committee voted, and the motion was rejected. However, it was decided that a special meeting will be held next month, as a work session to address some of the issues raised about the business plan.

As the meeting entered its third hour, it was noted that monthly meetings of the Fire Commission may need to be considered, due to the number and nature of agenda items.

The meeting schedule for the 2008 calendar year was also provided. January 17, March 20, May 1, July 17, September 18, November 20. Note that in past years, the May meeting has been rescheduled to coordinate with the county budget process.

Information Agenda

There was a presentation on Fire Protective Service Tax District Debt. It contained a lot of numbers.

There was a presentation of policy documents that relate to the appointments of county boards, commissions, committees, or authorities.

The meeting concluded shortly thereafter.





How many fires at occurred at the location of Watson's Flea Market? Mike's history pages have two. On April 30, 1982, a feather processing plant caught fire about 5 p.m. The thick smoke was seen as far as 30 miles away. The one-story brick building burned for about an hour, but the adjacent Watson's Poultry plant was not damaged. On February 12, 1994, the Watson's Flea Market restaurant burned. Two alarms for two-story structure, with Truck 1 operating.

But were there others? Readers recently asked about this. Today, scanning a newspaper from March 1987 found another. On March 28, a warehouse building at Watson's Marketplace Place was destroyed. Two businesses were lost, and third were damaged. Five fire units took more than three hours to control the 11:30 a.m. fire. Some 2,000 people were present at the time of the fire, most at the outdoor flea market. The *Raleigh Times* ran this photo:

News release. The City of Raleigh Fire Department lost one of its own on Tuesday, January 22. Lt. Herman S. Jones, a 27-year veteran of the Raleigh Fire Department, died after suffering an apparent heart attack. Lt. Jones was on duty Friday, January 18 at Fire Station 10 when he began to experience chest pains. He was transported to Wake Medical Center and then to UNC Hospital.

Lt. Jones began his service with the Raleigh Fire Department on May 5, 1980 and was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant on June 16, 2001.

Funeral arrangements will be handled by Haywood Funeral Home, 2415 South Wilmington Street. A memorial service will be held on Saturday, January 26 at Juniper Level Baptist Church, 9104 Sauls Road in Raleigh. A visitation will begin at 1 p.m. on Saturday and the service will be at 2 p.m. The burial will follow in the church cemetery.

Lt. Jones is the third firefighter to die while on duty. On April 20, 1965, Lt. Paul Mimms, 41, died of an apparent heart attack while operating a pumper at a structure fire. On March 10, 1956, Lt. Vernon Smith, 44, died from injuries suffered after his pumper overturned on November 14, 1952.





Let's divert exclusively into local history. Lee recently found this photo of the old Boylan Heights bridge. Built in 1913, the Warren Truss bridge was demolished in 1982. It was a registered as a national landmark, and its dilemma surrounding its status at the time led to the creation of the Boylan Heights Neighborhood Association. What's equally interesting about this undated photograph is that same shows a second bridge, that extended Martin Street from West Street to Kinsey Street. You can see still where the road ended, atop Kinsey and looking east.



Years ago, during the late 60s or early 70s, RFD responded to a lot of fire alarms on DDH grounds. By that time the one-way street craze had struck, and Martin Street was one-way, east bound, from Boylan Ave to East St. So units from RFD #1 would have a direct route, lane control lights, like the ones at RBC, were in place along Martin St. They were located between Harrington and Dawson, West and Harrington, and just off of Boylan. One would go red while the other green.

At the time my father worked for Dillon Supply, and I remember several times seeing the ALFs (two engines and the tiller) heading towards DDH, westbound on Martin.

The Cary Fire Department reports the following news. New Scott AP-75 air packs have been purchased for the entire department. The department bought 124 air packs, enough for both operations and training. The main reason for the upgrade was the number of older air packs that were reaching the end of their service life. Personnel are being training on the new air packs, which are expected to be placed in service in the beginning of March. The new air packs comply with the newest NFPA standards for air packs. The features of the new equipment include individual face masks with heads-up displays, and 30-minute carbon bottles.

The replacement for Truck 7 is expected in early June. The Pierce Velocity rescue truck will serve as a both a truck company and a rescue unit. The two-axle apparatus will be equipped with a non-walk in body, and was designed to meet ISO ground ladder requirements. It will be equipped with a full complement of ground ladders.

The replacement for Truck 6 is expected in early to mid-April. The Pierce Velocity ladder truck will serve as a truck company. It will be equipped with a 105-foot aerial ladder and a 1,500-GPM pump. The specs for the apparatus were based on Raleigh's recent Pierce ladder bid, but with a different chassis and other enhancements including a larger pump.

Work is proceeding to procure land for a new fire station in the O'Kelly Chapel Road area, off Highway 55. The station will likely be numbered Station 8. The time frame for construction, and the staffing of the station, are to be determined.

Excellent news on the new replacement equipment. I am excited to hear the prospect of station 8 to be built around the corner from me. I have been starving to hear the roar of a Q on a more frequent basis. Any chance that CFD station 7 might receive an aerial truck sometime soon?

Can anyone comment about the recent disappearance of CFD dispatch and operations from the Cary 800mhz trunk system? Where did everyone go?




May You Live in Interesting Times

02/13/08 1010 W, 9 I - + 11 - 15

Let's recap the last couple days of activity in Raleigh, with data as observed by Mike and Lee, and from media reports. We'll start with Saturday morning's house fire. The address was 704 Princeton Street. The structure was a single-story, brick-and-frame, 1,414 square-foot single-family dwelling built in 1968. Alarm time about 3:35 p.m. Car 20 was first on scene and reported fire through the roof, and one subject reported trapped inside. Crews made an interior attack against heavy fire, and then went defensive with hand lines and deck gun. One occupant escaped and was transported to a burn center. The other occupant was later found inside. Units included E9, E15, E16, E4, E19, E11, L16, R19, A8, B1, C20, C5, C2, C10, EMS3, EMS2, EMS5, EMS4, EMS D1, EMS T1. Car 20 and Engine 9 remained on scene through the morning, investigating with RPD and CCBI. "A" shift, then "B" shift was working. Lee Wilson photo:



The next big one was Saturday night, a major fire at 7013 Woodbend Drive. The structure was a two-story, wood-frame, 10,672 square-foot apartment building. Engine 4 was first on scene and reported a major working fire. Battalion 1 arrived and took command. Ladder 16 and Ladder 11 were positioned, but not needed. The interior attack contained and controlled within about 20 minutes. Four units were damaged, two with major smoke and fire damaged. The alarm time was about 10:00 p.m. Units included E4, E9, E15, E17, E19, E11, E18, L16, L11, R19, R14, B1, B4, C5, A8, C20, C2, EMS 121, EMS 16, EMS 11, EMS D1, EMS T1. "B" shift was still working. About 5:00 p.m., a brush fire on the east side of <u>Glenwood Avenue near Lake Boone Trail</u> was reported. The fire was started by a tree limb touching a power line, which ignited debris in a ditch. Flames climbed an embankment, and spread onto the 17th hole of a golf course. About five acres of the course were burned. The fire was controlled after 9:00 p.m. Units on scene included E14, E6, E5, E13, E8, Mini 3, B2, B3. Mike Legeros photo:



About 5:25 p.m., a dumpster fire was reported at a restaurant at <u>8011 Brier Creek Parkway</u>. Arriving units found flames had spread to the building. The fire was quickly contained. The building was safely evacuated. Units on scene included Bethesda T421, Raleigh E24, Durham Highway E1, Raleigh Battalion 2, two EMS units, and EMS D2. Other companies, including Raleigh Ladder 26 (!) were canceled. Lee Wilson photo:



Monday was quiet, but Tuesday started with a bang. Personnel at Station 2 heard the explosion at a metal recycling facility at <u>2310 Garner Road</u> about 10:45 a.m. The explosion was the result of live ammunition exploding in a compactor. Two workers were transported with injuries. Garner Road was closed and the area evacuated. Nearby rail traffic was also halted. The incident appeared to be winding down by noon, and most fire and EMS companies released around that time as officials awaited the arrival of demolition experts from Fort Bragg. "C" shift was

working. Lee Wilson photo:



Tuesday afternoon, subsequent identification of the ordinance caused an escalation of the incident. Three 90 mm rifle rounds and 18 anti-tank projectiles were found in the bales of scrap metal, reported WRAL the next day. Several fire companies and EMS units were recalled to the scene, with many other agencies soon arriving. A larger area was evacuated, with fire companies assisting with evacuating residents. Plans proceeded to begin exploding some of the ordinance, instead of moving same off-site. The first controlled explosion occurred at approximately 11:05 p.m., the sixth and last one at 2:40 a.m. The Beltline was closed for the first explosion, for approximately 30 minutes. The incident continued into Wednesday, today, with additional detonations. The process was expected to cease overnight, and resume Thursday night. Mike Legeros photo:

The Town of Clayton Fire Department is a combination department with full time and part time on call employees. During the restructuring of the department in the last ten years our staff has been recognized by the Town as employees not volunteers. Our recruitment and promotion process is the same for everyone. All part time on call staff receive hourly pay for incident response, training, scheduled equipment inspections/check-offs and special called duty shifts.

Effective 2/16/08 we began shifts at Station 2 with a Fire Equipment Operator (Driver) and a Firefighter. During daytime hours they are assisted with another Firefighter. After hours, weekends and holidays they are depending on the part time on call staff to respond to staff both engines with a full crew per our SOG. We have reprogrammed both Minitor and Alpha pagers for separate tones for station response. Major incidents will get a full response.

Our Manager and Town Council are committed to working with and helping all of our Town Departments. We have been allowed to increase our staffing, replace/add equipment and apparatus. It is up to the department as dedicated firefighters to respond to the calls for service by getting the required apparatus out of the station and safely to the incident.

I would like to personally invite everyone to come out and visit us at Station 2 on Sunday to ask questions about our department. Our recruitment process is in May and November. 

September 11, 1974 – Eastern Air Lines Flight 212, a DC-9, crashes on approach to Charlotte, North Carolina; 72 of 82 people on board are killed.

January 24, 1961 – A B-52 bomber suffered a fire caused by a major leak in a wing fuel cell and exploded in midair 12 miles (19 km) north of Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, Goldsboro, North Carolina. The incident released the bomber's two Mark 39 hydrogen bombs. Five crewmen parachuted to safety, but three died—two in the aircraft and one on landing. Three of the four arming devices on one of the bombs activated, causing it to carry out many of the steps needed to arm itself, such as the charging of the firing capacitors and, critically, the deployment of a 100-foot (30 m) diameter retardation parachute. The parachute allowed the bomb to hit the ground with little damage. The fourth arming device — the pilot's safe/arm switch — was not activated, and so the weapon did not detonate. The other bomb plunged into a muddy field at around 700 mph (300 m/s) and disintegrated. Its tail was discovered about 20 feet (6 m) down and much of the bomb recovered, including the tritium bottle and the plutonium. However, excavation was abandoned because of uncontrollable flooding by ground water, and most of the thermonuclear stage, containing uranium, was left in situ. It was estimated to lie at around 180 feet (55 m). The Air Force purchased the land and fenced it off to prevent its disturbance, and it is tested regularly for contamination, although none has so far been found. [22]



Taken at the training center in the 1970s, the first shows the 1979 Mack/1958 American LaFrance tiller prior to its paint job and behind-the-cab bench seat (which was interesting place to ride once it was installed, let me tell you), the plastic fire helmets with numbered shields, someone with a yellow helmet, and some red striped socks worn by whomever is playing the victim. The second shows the smokehouse, apparently in action. The gloves in the foreground bear the initials W.R.F. Perhaps it's a last name + Raleigh Fire? The third picture shows a view from above. Helmet numbers of the pictured are #363, #104, #209, and #396. Click to enlarge:









The yellow helmets were worn by the guys on Rescue. The helmets were Chieftains and MSAs.

The suspension in side of the helmets were the same type found in construction hardhats. Some of the helmets had elastic chinstraps, others had leather. MSA also had a unique style to their leather shields- the ones with a metal medallion mounted the medallion high on the shield center. They also had a specific style of lettering on the MSAs, which can be seen in the numbers 6, 9, or 8 on one of the shields.

The shields were made by Plectron from Overton, NE. They also made alert monitors and pagers for volunteers back in the day.

Ahhh...and the smoke house picture brings back memories...nothing like eating smoke to put hair on your chest!





The rent of the house on Method Road, used as Station 8 in the early 1960s, was \$100 a month commencing April 1, 1960. It was located north of Seymour's Auto Service... In 1969 on an unspecified date, the Public Works Committee recommended that the same architectural designs used for Station 4, Station 8, and Station 9 be used for any new fire stations to be constructed. Recommendation approved. No kidding... The fire department work week was reduced to 66 hours effective February 1, 1970. This action required 24 additional men: 6 captains, 7 drivers, and 11 privates... The bid amount for the first Mack CF pumpers was \$33,580.52 (per truck), plus \$3,400 for additional equipment. Five bids were received, unknown which other apparatus makers... By 1971, the price of a Mack pumper had increased to \$40,928... The Six Forks Road Volunteer Fire Department was contracted by the city in 1960 to protect city territory north of Crabtree Creek, for \$350 a month, until a fire station could be built... City minutes from 1961. "The Council was informed that firemen tore down old Fire Station No. 5 to make way for the new station, thereby saving the City considerable money, and that the material will be used to building a smoke house back of the present fire tower for training firemen. The Council expressed appreciation and commended Chief Keeter and members of his department for their cooperation"... The bidders for a 750 GPM pumper in 1949 were Howe, Pirsch, Oren, Mack, American LaFrance, Maxim, Ward LaFrance, and Seagrave. The award went to Mack, for \$13,300... Bids for the tiller in 1957 were submitted by only two companies, American LaFrance and Seagrave... City minutes from 1958: "The City Manager reported that the cooking range at Central Fire Station was worn out and after investigation it was recommended that it be replaced by a heavy-duty restaurant type stove, and he requested the Council to authorize a transfer of \$675 within the department for the purchase of the stove"... The expense of supplying air conditioning to the fire stations was approved in 1971... In January 1951, construction of an additional room at Station 4 was approved. It would be used as a kitchen, with firefighters providing the labor... City minutes from 1953, regarding acquisition of a Civil Defense rescue truck for the fire department: "the truck must be considered as a piece of stand-by equipment subject to call to Norfolk, Virginia, in the event of an attack by enemy forces"... The bid price in 1926 for a new American LaFrance pumper was \$12,500. The city received a \$1,500 discount, for trading an old Type 12 pumper... Salaries in 1947-48 included \$2,700 for Asst. Chief A. B. Lloyd, \$2,460 for mechanic May T. Parker, \$2,040 for the newest firemen, and \$1,560 for each of the three telephone operations.

Speaking of history and the current lack of working fires in Raleigh within the last week or so...in your research throughout the years, have you noticed or discovered a similar lull in working fires? I'm also wondering how the number of working fires in today's time compare to the number of fires in yesteryear...more, less, about the same? As always, just curious.

That is an interesting question, and one that's difficult to answer. My historical data is too spotty to fully answer the question. But we can make some observations.

In 1925, there were 8 working fires that used 3 or more lines. That year, RFD answered 338 calls. So, those 8 fires represented 2.4%.

In 1930, there were 6 working fires that used 3 or more lines. Out of 458 calls, they represented 1.3%

In 1935, there were 7 such fires. Out of 562 calls, they represented 1.2%

In 1949, there were 4 such fires. Out of 698 calls, they represented .5%

Call volume rising, and fires requiring 3 or more lines dropping. But it's just a sampling, and not necessarily with 100% valid data.

Last year, RFD answered nearly 35,000 calls. Let's say 40% of those were non-EMS calls. And using those early 20th century percentages, let's compute 1.5% of 14,000, or 210.

Last year, were there 210 fires that required 3 or more lines? That would be comparable to the 1930s, roughly, vaguely, possibly.

Ask again in another year or two, as I am always adding to my historical data.




Raleigh's Original Tiller Found and For Sale

The city's original tiller has surfaced in downtown Smithfield. Found by fellow fire photographer Carter Rabil, it's sitting in an open lot behind Boykin Motors at 650 S. Brightleaf Boulevard. Less than hour's drive from Raleigh, even on a Monday after work! The 1939/1916 American LaFrance served as Truck 1 until 1958, then as a reserve ladder for several years. It may also have seen service as Truck 6. The cab is a 500 Series, the ladder is a Type 17.

The wooden, two-section, 75-foot ladder was spring-raised for the initial elevation, then hand-cranked the rest of the way. Last seen sitting behind Station 8 in the early 1980s, the truck was sold as surplus and sat outside in Apex for the next 20 years. Random notes about this truck...

Personnel periodically refinished the wooden ladders. They'd scrape off the old varnish using broken glass.

The ladders were stored in a single rack, which rendered the tiller seat that much higher.

The tiller seat swung to the side, and the steering wheel was removed to raise the ladder.

The steering column was also removed, when the ground ladders were removed.

The ladder was raised by pressing a pedal, which released a lock, which caused a spring to raise the ladder by 30 or degrees.

The remaining elevation was achieved by hand-crank. Two additional cranks extended or retracted the second section.

A fourth crank on the turnable rotated the ladder.

The truck was stored at Station 6 for a period of time. To accommodate the length, a window was removed and a metal shell was added to protect the ladder that poked out.



Seems like Wildwood VFD outside of Morehead City had them also a few years back.

Building the Smokehouse

When was the smokehouse at the Keeter Training Center built? The range of dates has never been a mystery. On **August 21, 1961**, the Raleigh City Council was informed that firefighters had performed the demolition of old Station 5 on Park Drive, that they saved the city a considerable amount of money by performing the work themselves, and that the bricks would be used to build a smokehouse behind the training tower. In **August 1964**, a photo of the smokehouse appeared in the Raleigh Times. It was operational, being used for a fireman's school. The photo showed an apparently completed building, with two stories and a roof.

But when was it actually built? .

County real estate records say 1965. One retiree remembers it still not built when he started in September 1962. Sundry skimming of newspaper articles from summer 1963 found nothing. Nor was anything indexed in the City Council minutes from those years.

But what about the station log books? Not surprisingly, the answer was right there:

(Tuesday) March 24, 1964

[8:00 a.m.] Eng #1 & Truck #1 went to tower to clean bricks. 4 hours.

1:00 p.m. Eng #1 & Truck | #1 went [back] to drill tower to clean bricks. Returned to station at 4:30 p.m.

(Sunday) March 29, 1964



It will run as Truck 6. Cary FD will be phasing out the "Truck" concept in the future and migrating to the Engine, Rescue, Ladder concept of operations. But that will require a rework of the fireground operations and a CAD change in addition to a reevaluation of assignments (currently the Company Officers on Trucks and Rescues are Lt's, whereas on Engines and Ladders are Captains).

The replacement for Truck 7 is in construction as we speak and is more of a Rescue than a Truck. It will have a compliment of extrication tools in addition to the traditional truck company assortment, including a SCBA fill station/compressor. In the future these two trucks may be renamed as Ladder 6 and Rescue 7, but the time frame is undetermined.

Truck 6 will also serve as a reserve Ladder if L-1, L-3 or L-5 are out of service, and can act and be used as a Ladder for commercial alarms in District 6, preventing a Ladder from coming into the district. The only CAD change will be that Engine 6 will be picking up the EMS runs in District 6.



Years ago, many of the fire appratus manufacturers had two different trucks they would bid. If it was strictly low-bid situation, they had one truck they would bid, and for those that were not strictly low-bid, they had another truck. A sales rep for Seagrave told me that. And he showed me the difference right in their factory. Pierce did it also, as did E-One (I can show you some E-Ones in PA and NY that would rival anything Pierce has ever built). The low-bid trucks were intended to go up against smaller manufacturers, like Atlas/EEI was around here.

As the economy takes it's path, you will probably see more Contender-type offerings. Fortunately, RFD and CFD have found a way around low-bid, but a lot of others have not. They still have the administrations that look strictly at price. I have worked for a few of them over the years. **DJ** (Email) - 04/29/08 - 21:24

It's all about perspective. If you're used to having Dash-type trucks, the Contender just doesn't have the same quality. If you're used to having Ford/Chevy chassis with EEI-quality bodies, you're probably happy to get the Contender (which for some is their first custom). It's all about the money....you get what you pay for.

There was a recommendation I ran across several years ago that was geared along the lines of "commercial" vs "custom" cab/chassis for fire apparatus. In summary, the author said that unless the unit was running over 1,000 calls/year (about 3-4/day), a commercial cab/chassis would serve just fine.

Now we all know of departments/companies that don't run anywhere close to 1,000 runs in a year, yet they still buy full blown customized trucks.

And you'll probably remember during the eighties, Chicago, Boston, Los Angeles, Dallas, Charlotte, etc., ordered Ford C cabs for their pumpers, and occasionally for aerials. Those companies were running thousands of calls.

For me it's the simple fact that commercial cab trucks are not designed to be fire trucks period. They do not have the handling, braking,

acceleration nor safety features that custom cab trucks should/do have. We have custom chassis now with airbags, rollover protection, independent front suspension, and braking systems that are designed for the usage that we put them through. Yes commercial cabs will run forever if they are being used as a pepsi delivery truck that runs every day with the same driver and is not subjected to the rigors of emergency driving. There is also the issue of access and room within the cab. They are not user friendly during emergency operations, just look to see how high the steps are into the cabs. Not to mention the fact that these trucks are not designed to be used with SCBA seats. As for pumpers whenever you are adapting one thing to another there will be problems. It's why single source manufacturers are so sought after. It's a one stop shop and they design the chassis and cabs to be fire trucks, not concrete trucks or trash trucks.

I also think you get more service life out of a custom cab/chassis because it is doing what it is designed to do. For tenders and the like commercial cabs are fine, as the speed should be limited on these trucks anyways as the new NFPA 1901 standard dictates.

And then there are those people that tend to think that schools, parks, greenways, and libraries are way more important than fire trucks that are seldom used. Whereas the older commercial chassis tended to last longer, they were much better built. The current Freightliners and Navistars are just not built to the same standard. I would take the 1962 Chevrolet that was Yrac #1 over a modern day Freightliner or Navistar any day.

I do think that sometimes we overspend on some of the trucks. Although I have always liked all of the stainless and chrome trim, along with the bells, in my old age, with a mortgage and an annual property tax bill... I do question some of the expenses. While the younger me that lived for the pager thought "spare no expense for a nice truck", the older curmudgeon I am becoming takes the stance that if it does not contribute to the firefighting function of the vehicle or the safety of the occupants, then maybe it is a bit much. And I am also not one for all of these multi-mission trucks. It seems that they do a lot of stuff, but nothing real well. Oh well. I guess they did not consult me on that.

Now, if we could just get Pierce to build a 1 ton or 1 1/2 ton chassis, suitable for use as an (whispering) ambulance, then maybe we could get decent ones.

But I still do not like the 'multi-mission' trucks. My first exposure was to "TELE-SQUIRT 11" with Anne Arundel County (MD) Fire back in the 90s. It was a 1500 gpm pumper with a 75' telescoping boom, 500 gallons water, 250 gallons AFFF, four 1 3/4" crosslays, 1500' 5" hose, and all of the equipment carried on a pumper.

How did it work out? They got rid of it after 4-5 years. Too big for a pumper, too little for a ladder, not enough usable storage space, and the hosebed had trouble deploying the 5" LDH. Of course, part of it had to be in the design. But one thing for sure, it sure did look good.

Most of the time I see the 'quints' with a 1500 gpm pump and a 300-500 gallon tank, and the pump is seldom used, the hose is seldom (if ever used), etc. Same with most of the platforms that have crosslays- never have seen them used.

OK, back to the Contender. I have not had the chance to use or drive one (probably won't). I do remember using several trucks built on the Ford C series (the only dud was an Atlas model), and pre-90s Seagraves (awesome trucks), Pierces (they were the up-and-comer of the time), Ward LaFrances (has to be something said in running a truck with a Waukesha gasoline engine), Emergency Ones (before they got the idea to change to E-One- they were pretty good trucks), and the venerable Mack CFs and a Mack C (really awesome trucks). And of course, everyone should have to use an EEI custom at least once. It's the difference between a Ferrari and a Yugo. I guess you could say they just don't make them like they used to.

NFPA Apparatus Standards

From a reader, two new articles from *Fire Apparatus & Emergency Equipment* magazine provide details on revisions to the <u>NFPA apparatus standard</u>. The articles are by <u>C. Bob Barraclough</u> and <u>Robert Tutterow</u>. Some details:

- The new standard applies to all orders placed after January 1, 2009.
- Vehicle data recorders (VDR) on all vehicles.
- Automatic external defibrillators (AED) on all apparatus.
- Helmets stowed and secured when vehicle is moving.
- High-visibility traffic vests for each seated position.
- Five or more high-visibility traffic cones on all apparatus.
- Chevrons covering at least 50 percent of rear facing vertical surfaces.
- Chevron striping single color alternating between red and yellow, florescent yellow, or fluorescent yellow green.
- Chevron striping 6 inches wide.
- Aerials must be at least 50 feet long to be included in the aerial category.
- Aerials with a knuckle must have the knuckle painted with retro-reflective paint or reflective material.
- Foam systems not required, but highly recommended.

So am I correct in assuming these are still "optional" for apparatus purchased by Depts in NC? I believe that some states stipulate that apparatus purchased "in all or part" by taxation funds must comply with the existing NFPA standards, but I don't believe that NC is one of them. Anyone with insight on how these may apply in NC?

The manufacturers will typically not build a fire apparatus unless it meets the current NFPA standard that is in effect. Too much liability, unless the purchaser signs a waiver. The NFPA 1901 ROP (Draft) for the 2009 edition is at http://www.nfpa.org/aboutthecodes/AboutT..

Jon, I am unaware of a N.C. (state) requirement for tax fund supported apparatus purchases to follow the NFPA standard. However, I believe the Wake Co. Fire Commission's Apparatus Committee uses it as their standard.



Oldest Continually Operating Fire Company

The February-March edition of the <u>Extra Alarmer</u>, a buff's publication from the Twin Cities, features an article on the oldest, continually operating fire company serving the city of Minneapolis. Reading same promptly compelled a question about Raleigh: what is the oldest, continually operating fire company serving our city?

Let's go back to the end of 1912. Five volunteer fire companies stopped, and two fully-paid fire companies started. Hose Company 1 operated the equipment and occupied the facilities of the Capital Hose Company, organized and continuously operating since 1887. Hose Company 2 operated the equipment and occupied the facilities of the Rescue Hose Company, organized and continuously operating since 1870.

What about Hose Company 3, later Engine Company 3? Though they operated the equipment and occupied the facilities of the Victor Fire Company-- organized and continuously operating since 1869-- the city's third fully-paid fire company was not placed in service until February 1913. Ergo, interruption of service.

What about the truck company? The first fully-paid ladder company was not placed in service until February 1916, a full four years after the volunteer Hook & Ladder Company was removed from service. Another interruption of service.

Is the answer Hose Company 2, later Engine Company 2? Maybe, maybe not. When Station 1 on Morgan Street was closed in 1941, three pieces of apparatus required relocation: an engine, a service ladder, and an aerial ladder. The "new" Station 1 on Salisbury Street had but a single bay, so both ladder trucks were moved to Station 2 at Memorial Auditorium. Engine 1 occupied Station 1, along with Engine 2. Or that was the plan.

Records suggest Engine 2 may have been removed from service for a period between 1941 and 1949. The latter is the year the service truck was moved to a dedicated Station 6, and thus freeing one of the spaces at Memorial Auditorium. During this time, a two-man squad truck also operated. Was it called Engine 2? Was it the second engine's replacement? Alas, these facts are still unknown at this time.

That leaves Engine 1, which is at a minimum the second oldest, continually operating fire company serving the city of Raleigh. Organized as a Capital Hose Company in 1887, and replaced by Hose Company 1 in 1912. Thus, Engine 1 with 121 years of continual fire protection.

Future research may reveal that Engine 2 indeed takes the prize. Organized as the Rescue Steam Fire Engine Company in 1870, it was replaced by Hose Company 2 in 1912. And we can bump the Rescue period back by one year, as the organization was formed by members of the Merchants Independent Fire Company, which was organized in 1869.

Engine 2 with 139 years of continual fire protection? Could be.



Raleigh Announces Budget

The proposed FY09 budget for the city of Raleigh was announced today. Read the budget docs. Highlights include construction of Station 29 in northwest Raleigh, a new ladder company with 15 positions, a new pumper, more mobile data terminals (MDTs), and more back-up generators for fire stations. Station 29, to be located in northwest Raleigh, will serve Brier Creek and surrounding areas, house an engine and ladder, and be staffed by 30 people. The MDTs are for front-line apparatus and will provide real-time building and inspection data to personnel.

There's also an Interactive pump simulator planned, which will save an estimated 7 million gallons of water during an average training course; continuation of capital leadership training program for department personnel; and support of firefighter promotional process. Though vendor costs are rising, the budget notes, RFD is moving toward a two-year promotion list, which will lessen the frequency of the process.

Other budget items include uniform purchases deferred over past years, furnishing for remodeled administration and prevention offices, and facility and ground maintenance at the training center. For both fire and police personnel, starting salaries will increase by 5%, and then 3% increase after the academy. And there's major capital funding for the Clarence E. Lightner Public Safety Center.

Compression is right! The last time we had a big "New Hire" increase like this was around 99. They increased starting pay by 14%. I remember it because that year we made first class and got 5% plus a 7% raise, which gave us 12% increase. But the 2 academies behind us got a 12% increase that year and the next year when they made first class they past or group with another 5% raise. Point being they past us in PAY! I am not complaining by no means I LOVE my job, but when you start to get first class and new senior firefighters making \$1500 to \$2,000 more a year than a Lt. something does seem right! I had a senior firefighter tell me one time at work, "why do I want to get promoted to driver when I make more money than you with less the headache"! Anyway we do need to be competitive with the rest of the market when it comes to starting salaries but we also need to look after the long term employees also or we could run the risk of our experienced people leaving to go elsewhere for better top pay. That is what happened at PD, that is why they are trying new incentives! But I will repeat my self I love my job and I am thankful for the money I make!

I think that something you are starting to see is people leave RFD because of better opportunities. In the past, no one left and everyone put in their full 30 years. It seems people are now starting to use RFD as a stepping stone to better themselves. And to be totally honest, I don't blame them one bit. After all, RFD isn't going to take care of you, you have to do that for yourself. Eventually, RFD will have to take similar actions as RPD in order to keep highly motivated and experienced personnel. I also don't think this is a problem specific to RFD, as it is a problem across the country. This sort of thing happens on a daily basis in the business world. It is just now seeping down to the ranks of public safety.

Agreed! There have been far too many increases in starting pay – which is great for the new guys – but a steady erosion of the earning power of the remaining employees. My last two promotions have seen guys here 3, 4, 5 years less and 2-4 years less time in grade making more money than I. That very obviously indicates a compression problem. And I mean the term problem, not issue. We have begun to see a degradation in company loyalty brought on by the issues noted here and above. I too love my job. I would also like to see some of the extras like the PD is given in my check and my retirement as well.

Sniper Kills Three at North Hills Mall

05/24/08 173 W - + 13 - 17

Looking through a stack of clippings from the Seventies finds the account of May 29, 1972, Memorial Day weekend, when a sniper killed three and wounded eight others (one critical, three serious) before turning his rifle on himself. The shooting started about 12:05 p.m., and lasted from four to six minutes. The gunman stood in the parking lot, in front of Ronson's and beside the mall entrance. U.S. Sen. B. Everett Jordon was also at the mall, making a "handshaking visit," and had gone inside just prior to the shooting. His presence was unrelated to the shooter's motive. One car crashed into a couple others, as the window was shot out, though the driver uninjured. The extent of the response to the incident isn't noted, beyond that 8 of 10 city detectives were working on the case. And that the fire department was summoned to clean the scene. The 22-year-old young man purchased his 10-shot, semi-automatic .22 rifle at Thorne's Hardware Store on South Street at 10:30 a.m. that morning.

Being that it happened in 1972, not many people know about it outside of Raleigh. If it happened today, it would be around the country (if not the world) by 1230. RFD E9 went to clean up the blood. Beacon Ambulance sent several ambulances out, along with RFD R-1. I was fourteen at the time (yes, I'm getting old). My girlfriend called me that night and told how their teacher at Carroll Jr High would not let them leave the classroom.

A friend of mine at what was then Aycock Jr High had a sister that had dated the shooter for a while just before the incident.

Amazing how back then you knew a lot of people all over the city.

We lived in Wendell at the time, about 20 minutes outside of Raleigh. My mother took me (age 6) and my older sister (age 9) to the mall to shop several days after, and I remember that there was still blood on the pavement. It really scared me, and I remember her being really upset because she had not realized that there would still be remnants of the shooting, and I remember her covering my sister's eyes with one hand, holding my hand with her other hand and telling me to just close my eyes and follow her into the mall. It must have really made an impace because today, at 44 years old, I still remember the incident.

I was there that day, working at Ivey's. One woman who worked in my department went up to meet her newly wed husband for lunch. As he drove up he was shot he the head and did not survive. another man stumble into the jewelry section, front door of Iveys and fell to the floor. **rhea** - 07/26/12 - 19:28

The guy in the car who was meeting his newlywed wife for lunch, was Melvin Harrison Jr. He was my cousin. originally from New Bern,NC he went to school at NC State .

Mel was my best friend. He pledged Sigma Pi at NCSU, and I was his big brother there. His wife was named Brenda, who yes worked at Ivey's. He went to pick her up for lunch. It was just supposed to be lunch with his beautiful young wife.

He and Brenda were my good friends. I maintained contact with her for a while. She came to my wedding, as I recall. She later remarried, and I lost contact.

My sincere best wishes to her for a happy and fulfilled life.

On June 1, 1969, the city of Raleigh annexed the Brentwood subdivision, as well as an industrial district along Highway 1. The action added some 3,000 residents to the city population. The residents received one free month of municipal services, with property taxes due in 30 days. Their \$1 car tags-- remember those?-- were required on the day of annexation, however. Police officers and firefighters personally delivered brochures to each household, explaining city services and citizen obligations. Ah, simpler times.

And as I remember it was opposed by the residents, as was Oak Park several years later. The industrial tract included what was then the Westinghouse plant on what was then North Boulevard.

Eventually the car tags gave way to stickers, which went in the lower left corner of the windshield.


