
Back to Beacon Lake 12/04/10 221 W, 6 I - + 7 - 6

Winter is the perfect time for woodsy urban exploration. The green is gone, the leaves have died, and structures are at their easiest to spot. This summer, we <u>asked about the history of Beacon Lake</u>. Let's add a couple photos to this question, taken this afternoon. Found beside the northern segment of Beacon Lake Road are the remains of an apparent manmade (or man-reinforced) lake, along with good-sized concrete-block structure. The building's roof is partially collapsed.

There's what looks like the remains of a second building just to the north, a smaller structure with the outline of a foundation still standing. Plus a brick fireplace. The lake is drained, and apparently the result of a wall collapse on the south end. Presently a creek runs through the thing. What's the history here? Don't know. Click to enlarge:



<u>Wake County IMAPS</u> aerial views show the lake intact in 1988. The aerial view of 1981 shows what might be floating dock on the south end, which matches some posts and boards in the present location. Looks like perhaps access to the lake and its facilities was from the east, from the present Corporate Parkway? Guess more exploration is in order! More photos to be posted on Mike's photo site.
