

Meeting of the Board of Aldermen, Town of Chapel Hill, N. C., Book 5, Page 231.

DECEMBER 9, 1929.

There was a regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Chapel Hill, held at 7:30 o'clock P.M., December 9, 1929, Mayor Council presiding, with the following aldermen present: Messrs Burch, Hogan, Thompson, and Eubanks.

The Manager read the Minutes for the meeting of October 14, October 21st, November 4th, November 20th, December 2nd, - all of which were approved.

There was much discussion in regard to changing the meeting night from the Second Monday of each month to the Second Wednesday of each month.

The following motion was introduced by Alderman Eubanks, and seconded by Alderman Thompson, -

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF CHAPEL HILL, THAT the regular meeting night of the Board of Aldermen shall be the Second Wednesday of each month.

All members of the Board of Aldermen present voting in the affirmative therefor.

Dr. W. F. Prouty and Dr. F. H. Edmister were present at this meeting to discuss with the Board of Aldermen some means of gaining protection from fire for the territory lying just outside of Chapel Hill.

Mayor Council read the following letter from Mr. H. N. Pye, Chief Engineer of the Southeastern Underwriters Association:-

Dear Sir:

Your letter of November 22nd, addressed to Mr. William F. Dunbar, Manager of this Association, has been referred to this Department for attention and reply.

You advise us that you have recently had a fire in Chapel Hill, which has brought about much argument, owing to the fact that it occurred just outside the boundaries of the Town, and you request us to advise you if we have any definite ruling regarding the fire apparatus leaving the corporate limits of the cities and towns.

It seems perfectly natural that a city or town in its discretion should furnish assistance in emergency cases where property is being destroyed by fire in the immediate vicinity, and outside of the city limits, but we believe that this is a matter that must be left to the discretion of the city authorities, as to whether they will allow the only piece of apparatus for fire protection to leave the city, and take the chances of a fire happening while it is away, and consequently, no protection in case of a fire in the city.

For your information, we are herewith enclosing a copy of our report on the various features upon which your city is graded for the classification on which it is now rated, and we find that you now have 750-gallon, triple combination pumper, chemical hose and car.

Therefore, if the city officials in their discretion, desire to furnish protection outside the city limits in case of emergency, it is reasonable that additional apparatus should be supplied in the city to take care of such emergency, so that the fire apparatus upon which the basis of the classification is made, should at all times be available in the city.

In reply to the second paragraph of your letter, we regret to advise that practically impossible to formulate a definite ruling, regarding the fire apparatus leaving the corporate limits, as we believe that this is a question that should be decided by the city authorities.

It was the sense of the Board of Aldermen that if the Town of Chapel furnish protection for the people living outside of the town limits, that additional equipment would have to be purchased, and that the people living outside would have to pay for this equipment. The Town of Chapel Hill would furnish the men to man the equipment in caring for the use of this equipment in emergency cases in Chapel Hill.

Alderman Eubanks moved that a committee be appointed to act with the committee appointed by the people living outside,, so as to go into the matter of purchasing additional equipment and the method of paying therefor.

The motion was seconded by Alderman Burch.

Mayor Council appointed Messrs Hogan and Burch on this committee.
