Let me again renew my hopes that the departments of the State will observe our regular memorial day, in accordance with our ritual, in a manner worthy of the sentiment that it so eminently merits.

I recomend that a copy of the ritual be published in our annual year book. In accordance with Topic No. 4, I recommend the annual appropriation of \$500.00 or at least as much as 5 per cent. of the Insurance tax that now goes into our general fund amounts to (not to exceed that amount) be appropriated as a bonus to the Town or City, that entertains our annual Convention and Tournaments, to help them defray the necessary expenses incident to the occasion.
