
- 1. The name of this corporation is the New Hope Volunteer












Temporary Fire Station Metal Building with A-Frame Roof








First Responder, 1982




Station Expanded Again, by 1985



The Wake County Board of Commissioners approved the expansion of the department's tax district on April 18, and construction of the facility began early last month. The Steel Dynamics Co. of Bunn is the construction contractor.

"The building is completed and halled in, but the office area isn't completed yet," Vaughan said. The trucks are protected and the doors can be opened and closed. 
Wake New Hope Fire Department Current Coverage


- Wake New Hope Fire Department Fire Station 1 service area has changed dramatically from the 1960s through 2022
- Most of this area has been annexed by the City of Raleigh, leaving small pockets of unincorporated areas of land and homes
- Less than 5 square miles remain for New Hope Station 1 to cover

Proposal

- Multi-year North Carolina
 Department of Insurance-approved auto aid agreement for Fire and EMS service delivery
- Areas that are more than five miles from Wake New Hope Station 2 will receive a City of Raleigh Fire Department response
- Service transfers on July 1, 2022
- Current Wake New Hope Fire Department personnel resources will be moved to Station 2
